THE ALASKAN FISHERMAN.

Crude Tackie Siere Effective Than Our Improved Implements. With his homemade fishing tackle one hative Alaskan can capture more fish in a day than can any three white men with their latest improved implements. These Indians use the same fishing tackle that Berin found them using during his explorations of 1741 and which George Vancouver found during his first visit among them as a midshipmite under the famous Capitain Cook a few years later.

Fish are abundant. Alaskan homes are always near some excellent fishing grounds. A village is often situated in a certain location simply to be near good halibut banks. Hooks used in fishing for halibut are usually made of a fork of spruce root to which an iron barb has been lashed, the only change from the original being in the iron barb which sometimes takes the place of the one of bone used in the primitive hook. All bait is secured to the hook by means of a small cedar cord, which is neatly lashed about the hook when it is not in use.

Halibut feed near the bottom of the sea. The Indian has a method, as ingenious as it is rude, to keep his balt where it will be most tempting.

He will tie a stone a few feet above the hook on his line with a slip loop, which the halibut, in trying to get away, will twitch out, releasing the stone and giving twitch out, releasing the stone and giving the Indian warning that he can draw up his 50 or 100 pound halibut without the additional weight of the stone. 

AN ARAB SLAVE HUNT

DESCRIPTION OF A RAID ON AN AF-RICAN VILLAGE.

The Surprise, the Flight of the Braves and the Capture of the Women and Children-The Bansom. and How It Was Extorted and Paid.

Perhaps the simplest method of describing the raiding system as practiced by the Arab bands in the forest region between the Aruimi and the Kongo would be in the form of a brief narrative of events based upon personal observation. The caravan whose adventures we are about to follow was under the command of Osmani, a middle aged Arab who had penetrated the continent from Zanzibar more than 20 years before. When the poor women realized they were free to depart, they darted forward with extraordinary agility into the woods.

On the morning of the fifth day the Arab camp was halled by a voice from the forest, 'Is it true that our women are still alive?' "It is true, It is indeed true," replied a Manyema in the native dialect. "I bring tusks of elephants. But first let me hear their voices that I may know you speak truly." The women were soon produced and were made to shout a reply to the native chief, who was all this time concealed from sight among the trees. After much delay, during which the Manyema in turns coaxed and threatened the timid and suspicious native, the young chief at length mustered sufficient courage to step forth. Depositing his burden of ivory in the open, he glanced meaningly in the direction of the Arab's camp. Instantly several women were liberated, and they rushed to the woods. In this fashion, during several subsequent days, the Arab chief was grad-ually relieved of his prisoners, and in their place he became enriched by a substantial stock of ivory. - Cassell's Magazine.
