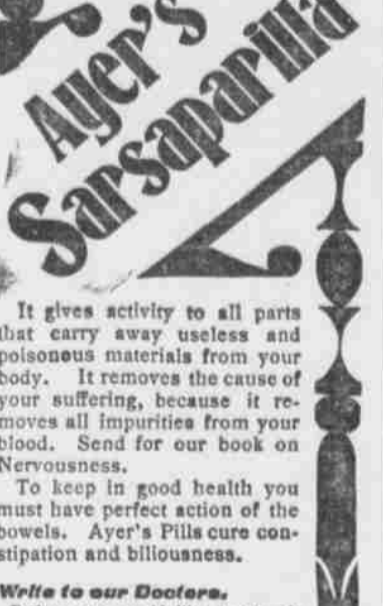

**BEFORE THE JUSTICES.**

Many Cases Before Them Saturday Night and Yesterday.

Among the cases heard by Justice Shoemaker were the following:

Stani Langowski, assault and battery, on oath of Joseph Krystowicz; \$400 bail. A quarrel resulted from a game of cards and the complainant said he was knocked down and robbed of \$25.

Charles Zigmunt, larceny of a miners' axe, on oath of John Kuszkowski; \$300 bail.

William Rabikes, assault and battery, on oath of John J. Pempy. The prosecutor served in the regular army recently and was beaten because he resented uncomplimentary remarks the defendant made concerning the army.

Mrs. Wladislaw Fredina, assault and battery, on oath of Andrew Pierjak; \$300 bail.

John and Mary Wasser and Mike Crankas, assault and battery, on oath of William Anus. Each of the men was held in \$1,000 bail, and the woman in \$300.

Justice Tuomey disposed of the following cases:

George Deuch, disturbing the peace, on oath of Frank Witsotzky; John Kofelock and Thomas Powlnski, same charge on oath of Policemen Heaton and Hand. In all these cases the defendants paid the borough fine and costs.

John Clippin was put under \$300 bail on a charge of interfering with Policeman Heaton when he was making an arrest. Two other men were wanted on the same charge.

**A HOT TIME.**

Hundreds of people were attracted to the grounds about the Pennsylvania Railroad station at about six o'clock last evening by a combination of exciting events, the first of which was a rough and tumble fight between two Poles, in which one of them was beaten with a blackjack and cut with a knife. Subsequently two young men indulged in fist-fighting, and to cap the climax, a Polish woman and her husband, both of whom were intoxicated, tumbled down the embankment near the place. It was said the woman fractured her jaw, but this could not be confirmed.
