Leave Manila to Report to Their Superior Officers.

EXPECTED TO RETURN SOON.

The President of the Filipino Commission Says Our Government's Plan Is a Good Colonial System, but Ob-

Manila, May 26 .- The Filipino commissioners left here by special train yesterday. They were escorted to their lines under a flag of truce. It is expected they will return soon. President Gonzaga, of the Philippine ommission, previous to his departure, said: "We greatly appreciate the cour-tesy shown us. We have spent some time with your commissioners, inci-dentally considering the American constitution. Its principles impress us profoundly. The plan of government offered the Philippines theory, a good colonial system. But why should a nation with your con-stitution seek to make a colony of a distant people who have been so fighting against Spain to secure the same rights your constitution gives?
