Third Infantry, returning to Balinag from San Miguel, were attacked morning, noon and evening by a large force of enemy, suffering in casualties two men killed and 13 wounded; enemy repulsed, leaving on the field 15 killed, large number wounded and prisoners."

Chester, Pa., May 26.—The sale of \$180,000 of 3 1/2 per cent 30-year bonds of the city of Chester yesterday, for the purpose of refunding the same amount of 5 per cent bonds due July 1, was the most successful that the city has ever had. There were 30 bids. The award was made to Dick Brothers, of Philadelphia, at 103 1/4. The city realized \$14,632, said to be the best price ever paid for bonds in the State of Pennsylvania, excepting an issue made by the city of Philadelphia last year. There were bids received from Boston, New York, Cleveland, Philadelphia and Chicago.
