The Defender Picnic. The picnic held on Saturday at Turkey Run, under the auspices of the Defender Hose Company, was a success.

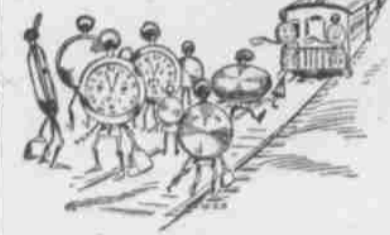

John Fahy, organizer of the U. M. W. A., has organized a number of locals in and about Shamokin.

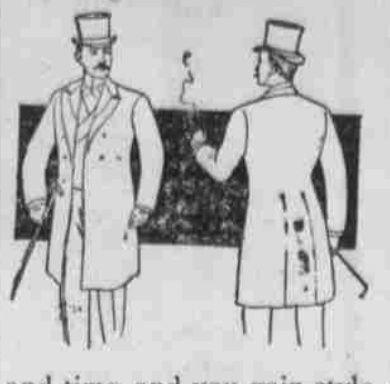
