CONFERENCE ON CUBA.

Our Military Commanders Considering Ways and Means.

UNRECONSTRUCTED CUBAN BAND

Held by Jose Manuel Guerra, a Mulatto Captain. They Are Encamped Between Hicton and Santiago de las Vegas.

Havana, June 2.—Governor General Brooke and the governors of the military departments had a conference lasting three hours yesterday regarding the general situation in the island. They then adjourned together, after which another two hours was occupied with a less formal discussion.

Patricio Valdez and Antonio Perez, citizens of Havana, say that on Monday, while in search of work, they reached Rincon, in this province. They found no work there, but a Cuban captain gave them food and the captain's lodgings, and on the next day they resumed their search.

Cubans in Havana say that Jose Manuel Guerra, a mulatto captain who disappeared from the army last April, answers the description given of the leader of the band.

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MAJ. MARCHAND'S PLEA.

He Wants His Black Followers to Visit Paris,

AND WILL DOUBTLESS SUCCEED.

The Popular French Hero Adds to His Popularity by a Brief Speech Urging Republican Unity—He Makes a Favorable Impression.

Paris, June 2.—Major Marchand arrived in Paris at 10 o'clock yesterday and has been on the move ever since. He attended the state luncheon at the ministry of marine, where he received a gold medal and a sword of honor.

Another gold medal and sword of honor, on the sword handle by a crocodile and a palm tree.

The company at luncheon was chiefly official. Many admirals, generals and other naval and military commanders attended, and they were all in full dress uniform.

Major Marchand, as the chief guest, took Mme. Lockroy, the wife of the marine minister, into the banquetting room.

At luncheon Marchand pleaded with Mme. Lockroy for his Senegalese sharpshooters to have an opportunity to visit Paris.

He told her that the prospect was their great incentive to exertion in the march across Africa. Whenever their courage flagged, Marchand cried to them: "Boys, another strong effort to make sure of seeing Paris!"

This electrified them. They were less starving. Wild oats and grasses lent grace to the floral harmony.

After a tour of the other ministries, Major Marchand reached the military club. The space in front of the building had been cleared by the police, and the explorer's arrival was the signal for an outburst of cheering.

There were immense crowds in the neighboring streets, the windows were filled with spectators and the roofs were covered with people.

Major Marchand and Captain Barthelemy appeared on the balcony of the club in response to cries, which were then redoubled. The demonstrations continued to a late hour in the evening, the crowds parading and shouting the now familiar cries, and singing the "Marseillaise."

A royalist band, carrying a flag, was dispersed by the police, and an attempt to create a demonstration in favor of De Roulede was quickly drowned by cheers for Marchand and the army.

A dramatic scene occurred at the military club in the course of the evening. Major Marchand, in response to loud cheering, appeared upon the balcony with the minister of marine, M. Lockroy, and the minister of war, M. Kreutzer, on either side of him, and shouted "Vive la Republique!"

The demonstration in the Place de la Bourse, which was held by the Boulanger agitation, fully 80,000 people crowded the Place de la Bourse, and the small coach returned from Versailles and was obliged to run into the excited crowd it had a narrow escape and was saluted with hostile cries.

The people made an ugly rush for the vehicle, but the police executed two energetic charges and enabled the passengers to alight safely.

The chamber of deputies last evening adopted a resolution of thanks to Major Marchand for his services in Africa and to General Gallieni for his brilliant administration in Madagascar.

The reaction was opposed by M. Albert Joseph Walter, revolutionary socialist, deputy for St. Denis, who was vigorously hooked.

Marchand looks a hero after Victor Hugo's heart. He is silent, thoughtful and modest, without boastfulness.

He is not an American, but strong an impression does he give of unaffected stoicism and dauntless firmness. His face is deeply lined and careworn, but the sweetness of his countenance is indescribable.

He seems gentleness itself when the lines relax into a smile. Every one who sees is favorably impressed with him.
