ONDER THE BLACK FLAG

Striking Italians Make Another Threatening Demonstration.

ARMED DEPUTIES TO THE RESCUE

Seven Hundred of the Strikers Paid Off and Permanently Discharged-They Were Informed They Would Be Shot Down If They Caused Further Trouble

Paterson, N. J., June 8.—The strike of the Italian laborers employed by the East Jersey Water company, on Notch road, on the outskirts of Paterson, assumed a serious aspect yesterday. About 700 of the strikers marched in a body to Little Falls, where they had compelled a large number of laborers to quit work on Tuesday. They carried at the head of the procession a black flag, with skull and crossbones. The strikers carried clubs and were in an

ugly mood.

When they arrived at Little Falls they found that about 160 American laborers and mechanics were at work.
They ordered them to quit. Superintendent Young called upon the sheriff of Passale county for assistance. Twenty deputy sheriffs were sent to the scene of the trouble. Most of the Italfan strikers apparently understand but little English, and through interpreters Superintendent Young told them that they could all return to work on the old conditions, and all those who did not do so would be paid off and new men employed in their places.

Some of the strikers said they were willing to return to work, but were afraid to do so for fear they would meet with violence at the hands of the ringleaders of the strike. When the deputy sheriffs arrived the

strikers again formed in line and marched up the Notch road. Yesterday afternoon Superintendent Jones paid off 700 of the strikers and told them to leave, as they would not be taken back to work. The strikers crowded around the armed deputy sheriffs. A spokesman for the latter told the strikers that if they did not leave at once, and attempted to make any resistance, they would be shot

down. The Italians muttered in an excit-able manner, and a large gang of them went away and erected a black fing. There was an inscription in Hallan stating the strikers' grievances and in large letters these words: "Who cuts this down will die." Superintendent Jones, protected by

the deputies, hauled down the black flag. The strikers then went to another point, where they flung to the breeze another black flag.

Some of the new men, while return-ing to work yesterday afternoon, were stoned by the strikers. The latter, who received their wages, finally went to some low grog shops and began to drink heavily. It is feared they will make further trouble.

A press cor-respondent, under date of the Sunniva's sailing, writes: "When General Torres left Bluefields for the interior with 165 soldiers and 41 prisoners the Costa Rican authorities refused to allow the force to pass through. As a consequence the solliers and prisoners were left in Greytown and Torres went on into the interior to report the matter to Zelaya, Troops and supplies, it is said, are now being rushed to the border by both Costa Rica and Nicaragua."

VICTIMS OF THE HEAT.

Many Fatalities Reported in and About New York.

THIRTY-FIVE DEAD IN TWO DAYS

Aside From These There Were Thirtythree Prostrations, the Victims of Which Are in the City Hospitals in a More or Less Serious Condition.

New York, June 8.-Although the temperature was several degrees lower during the latter part of yesterday, and a stiff, cooling breeze from the northeast started up at night, the record of fatalities for the day exceeded by far those of Tuesday in this city and vicin-Altogether there were 28 deaths from the heat in this vicinity, and 10 of these victims were women. Aside from this there were 34 proatrations, the vic-tims of which are still in the city hos-pitals in a more or less serious con-dition. In New York city alone 22 deaths were recorded, and Hacken-sack, Newark, Plainfield, Passaic and Morristown each reported one death, One of the victims was a suicide, who took his own life because of his suf-ferings from the heat. For two days deaths from beat sum up 35.

At the begining of the day the thermometer registered two or three degrees above that of Tuesday. But as the day passed the mercury slowly co tracted, and the afternoon was slightly cooler than Tuesday. The wind, which had been shifting during the day from the south to the northwest, suddenly took a change and came from the northeast. The temperature rapidly fell. Between 8.30 p. m. a drop of 13 degrees was recorded. At 8.30 p. m. the thermometer registered 73 degrees

at the office of the weather bureau.

A man believed to be J. Meyor, a citizen of Cleveland, was found at Laight street, near St. John's Lane, unconscious and suffering from the heat. He is about 40 years old, well described and had \$200 to conduct the best. dressed, and had \$200 in cash in his pockets. The only clew to his identity may be a telegram which was found in a pocket. He died in the hospital without regaining consciousness.

PHILADELPHIA HEAT VICTIMS. Six Deaths Reported From the Two

Days' Torridity. Philadelphia, June 8.-As a result of the excessive heat two persons died in this city on Tuesday. From the various hospitals nearly a hundred cases of heat prostrations were reported. Those whose death was attributed to the heat on Tuesday are Hannah S. Cohert and an unknown Italian, who died at the Presbyterian hospital. He was prostrated at Overbrook.

Four other deaths from the heat were reported yesterday. The victims were: Rachel Wahls, aged 50 years; Jacob Wexler, 6 months; M. Reico Giovanni, a child; Mrs. Jacobs, col-

Coroner Dugan held an inquest yesterday into the case of Edward Pierce, who died in the Pennsylvania hospital on Monday from the excessive heat. Pierce, who was 55 years old, was overcome in the street by the heat on Sunday. The jury assigned Pierce's death to heart disease, superinduced by heat prostration.

Although the temperature reached

only 95 degrees yesterday, two degrees lower than Tuesday's figures, the average temperature for the whole day was several degrees higher than on Tuesday. The humidity was also unusually high.

Life Sentence For Attempted Rape Columbia, S. C., June 8.-Two negro boys convicted at Conway, Horry county, of attempting to rape two white girls several months ago, were yesterday sentenced to life imprisonment.

A NICARAGUA REBELLION.

Mosquito Coast Indians Urge Chief.

Clarence to toad Them. Kingston, Jamaica, June 8.—Mail adrices from the Mesquito const say the Indiana there have rebelled against the government of Nicaragua, are taking the war path and are sending a delegation to invite Prince Clarence to head their riving, which, it is said, will probably receive financial support from the foreign residents of the Mosquito coast. Prince Clarence is now at Kingston, but he recently declared he would never break faith with the British government, preferring his easy retirement here to active life as king of the Mosquito coast.

Prince Clarence, otherwise Chief Clarence, the former ruler of the Mosquito coast, is now about 25 years old Some five years ago, as hereditary chief of the Mosquito coast territory he came into power over about 10,000 subjects. Nicaragua at that time had begun to encroach on the Mosanito territory, and Chief Clarence resisted succossfully. But the state of affairs which followed compelled the United States consul at Bluefields to ask pro-tection for the Americans there, and Chief Clarence, after repeated defeats, was compelled to seek refuge on board the United States cruiser Marblehead. In August, 1894, he landed at Kingston, Jamaica, and has since been pensioner of the British government.

Death of a Philadelphia Publisher. Philadelphia, June 8.—Vincent Mc-Laughlin, publisher of the Philadelphia Times, died at his home here at 2 o'clock this morning. Mr. McLaughlin was 34 years of age, and succeeded to the ownership of The Times upon the death of his father, Frank McLaughlin, about 18 months ago.
