HIS TRIP TO THE GRAND PRIX

All Along the Route the Pollowers of the Republic Cheered His Progress An Assault, If Intended, Would Have Been Impossible.

Paris, June 12,-President Louber has had his revanche for the outrage at Auteuil. When he drove to Longchamp yesterday to attend the Grand Prix he was the hero of a great popular demonstration, expressing itself in one form or another along the whole route from the Elysce palace to the race course.

He remained only a quarter of an hour, just long enough to witness the race, and, having congratulated the owner of the winner, returned to the Elysee, where he arrived at 4 o'clock

without special incident. The Revisionist and Socialist organs summoned their readers to assemble along the thoroughfares to be traversed by the president and his party, and from the hour of noon thousands of demonstrators set out from Montmartre, Belleville and other working class quarters, in big organizas highly as others whose statements I read. ed bands, all wearing a small artificial On using them as directed they removed all red flower in the buttonhole, and marched across Paris, taking up positions along the Avenue des Champs Elysees and the Avenue du Bois de Boulogne.

They gave M. Loubet a tremendous ovation, confining their cries almost entirely to "Vive Loubet" and "Vive la republique." The president did not hear a discordant cry, although there were one or two scuilles before and after he passed between the police and occasional hot headed anti-Dreyfusard, who tried to shout "A bas oubet," and was immediately pounded upon by a swarm of policen

Although the visit passed off quietly, the government was prepared for every eventuality, the whole district between the Elysee and Longchamp literally teeming with troops and police. A po-liceman was stationed every dozen yards along the whole route, and there ere squadrons of dragoons armed with lances and mounted Republican Guards at all important points, while through the green foliage of the Bols n each side of the avenue, could be seen heavy masses of red and blue denoting the presence of detachments of soldiers, awaiting orders.

Longehamp resembled a military amp. Battalions of infantry, squad-ons of dragoons and Republican Guards were distributed all around the ourse. It is estimated that there were 15,000 soldiers and police under arms. M. Loubet practically drove through

a double hedge of steel. A line of in-fantry even stood around the race course, between the public and the course, on which no one was allowed o walk between the races, while several Republican Guards patrolled the ourse itself.

The president left the Elysee at 2 o'clock in an open landau, with M. Dupuy, the premier, beside him, and General Bailloud, chief of the presidential household, and Major Bon lieutenant colonel of horse artillery attached to the person of the presi-dent. Mme. Loubet followed in a second landau, after which rode the presi-dential suite in other carriages. The famous outrider, Montjarred, preceded M. Loubet, whose landau was drawn by four horses, with a couple of postil-lions, and escorted by a picked body of cuirassiers. All were men of fine physique and formed a splendid cavalcade with the flery sun glinting on their burnished steel breastplates and helmets, the latter surmounted with

horsehair plume. The two leading cutrassiers rode, revolvers in hand, with fingers on the trigger, and carefully watched each side of the road, while beside the carringe ran a number of policemen, rendering it absolutely impossible for

anybody to approach. On arriving at the race course the president drove through the paddock to the presidential box. Municipal guards and police lined the path across the paddock. Drums beat and trum-pets blared when M. Loubet appeared the front of the box, and a scene of intense enthusiasm, lasting several
