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M. POINCARÉ DISGUSTED

He Gives Up the Attempt to Form a French Cabinet.

M. WALDECK-ROUSSEAU TRIES IT

Mr. Delcasse, who was called after the failure of Poincaré, declined to make the attempt—had feared demands were too much for Poincaré.

Paris, June 17.—M. Poincaré yesterday went to the Elysée palace and informed President Loubet that he would make no further effort to form a ministry. M. Poincaré's decision was reached after a long conference with MM. Brisson, Sarrien and Mongeou, radicals, who finally refused to agree to the conditions on which M. Poincaré offered them representation in the cabinet.

M. Poincaré complains bitterly that he offered every possible concession to



the radicals, but they wanted, he says, to have everything in their own hands. He declares he has enough of cabinet making and will not be in a hurry to return to the task.

After M. Poincaré had left the president summoned Mr. Delcasse, who declined to attempt the formation of a ministry. Then Senator Waldeck-Rousseau was summoned, and he accepted the task.

It is believed that strong pressure was brought to bear upon M. Waldeck-Rousseau, but as the Socialists and radicals virtually dominate the situation, no combination is likely to be long lived.

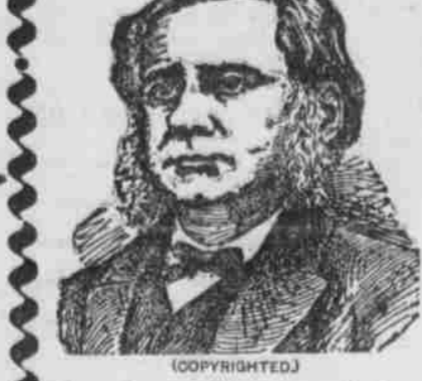
A New Station For Newport.

FLED INTO THE JUNGLE

Filipino Boldly Beaten by Our Western Volunteers.

AGUINALDO COMMANDED REBELS

A Spanish Officer Released by Aguinaldo Gives a Circumstantial Story of the Assassination of General Luna. Rebel Atrocities in Candaba.

Manila, June 17.—After cutting the railroad and telegraph at Apalit, seven miles south, for the purpose of severing connection, the rebels attacked General MacArthur's lines at San Fernando at 4:30 yesterday morning. They met with an unexpected warm reception and were captured with a loss of 70 killed, 30 prisoners and many wounded.

The rebel force, estimated to have numbered 5,000 men, advanced stealthily from the jungle north of the city and then divided, with the evident purpose of surrounding the Americans. The outcome of the 600 years of treatment discovered the enemy and retired to their lines, where the entire division awaited in an entrenched position. The Iowa regiment and the Kansas regiment received the first shock of the attack. Reserving their fire until the enemy was within 100 yards, the first volley of the Americans hit the rebels, who returned the fire wildly, the rest of their line falling to advance. The Americans, who thoroughly enjoyed the novelty of the situation, awaiting an attack, sallied forth, and the insurgents thereupon turned and fled into the jungle. Our losses were 14 men wounded, and the majority of them are only slightly hurt.

General Funston's brigade of Kansas and Montanans and General Hale's brigade, the Seventeenth regiment and the Iowa regiment, constituted the force engaged. Aguinaldo is reported to have personally conducted the attack, and preparations were made for several days to bring forward troops from Candaba, and others, from Dagupan, were transported by rail.

Along the front of the Kansas regiment rebel dead were counted.

The first news of the Filipino advance was reported by a telegraph operator who was sent to the bridge at Apalit to ascertain the cause of a break in one of the wires. He was compelled to beat a hasty retreat, and a Spanish officer who has been a prisoner in the hands of the rebels and who was released by Aguinaldo has come through our lines to Manila. He claims to have been a witness of the assassination of General Luna. According to his story, the relations between the two Filipino leaders had been strained to the breaking point because of Luna's attempt to assume control of affairs, and the final rupture was forced by Aguinaldo issuing secret orders to the provincial government to treat Luna as a rebel. Aguinaldo, demanding copies of the documents, and Aguinaldo replied curtly that Luna was a general of the army and that the civil government did not concern him. Luna, on opening the reply at headquarters, in the presence of his officers, exclaimed: "Holy! He will be dead tomorrow."

"One officer, who was friendly to Aguinaldo, hastened to warn him, and Aguinaldo called together 20 trusted soldiers, fellow townsmen of his, and stationed them around his house, with instructions to kill any one attempting to enter, except Aguinaldo.

Luna appeared the next day and saw Aguinaldo at the window.

A member of the guard said: "Aguinaldo has gone to inspect troops."

Luna then exclaimed: "You are a liar," drew his revolver, struck the guard and tried to force an entrance into the house. Before he could use his revolver one of the guards bayoneted him, and another shot him in the back, and others stabbed him. In all he had 20 wounds. Luna's aide de camp was killed in the same way.

The Spaniards' story has not entirely dispelled the doubts of Luna's death, and bets that he is alive are freely made at the clubs. Some people think Aguinaldo has taken pains to send the Spaniards here with this story for the furtherance of some diplomatic scheme, while others suspect Aguinaldo has been assassinated by Luna.

Since the Americans withdrew from Candaba recently the rebels have returned and have wreaked vengeance upon those who befriended the Americans. They slaughtered the natives who surrendered the town and displayed their heads on poles in the public square.

The hostile natives of Cebu are more menacing. Mail advices say hostilities against the Americans have begun there. Colonel Hamer, the American commander, has asked for reinforcements, and four companies of the Tennessee regiment have been sent to him from Manila.

The Nebraska regiment has been ordered to sail for home early next week.
