Chronicled for Handy Perusal.
Saturday night's storm did considerable damage in the vicinity of Pottsville. Coalville, this county, is probably the only town in the state having a population of 3000 without street lights.
Henry Sieck, Mahanoy City, and Margaret Walsh, of Mahanoy township, have been granted a marriage license.
The Columbia Social Club, of Mahanoy City, will hold their first dance in the pavilion at Lakeside on Wednesday evening.
The scarlet fever placard has been removed from the residence of Charles Norkewicz, on East Centre street.
The report that Dennis Doyle, of Oakland, had been drowned in New Jersey is erroneous. It was an announcement in the city papers.
The demand for rolling mill hands at the Birdsboro Iron Works still exists. Agents of that firm are going all through this region to secure hands to work there.
A civil service examination for janitor and fireman, at a salary of \$900 a year, in the Government custodial service at Pottsville, will be held there on August 1.
Ten cartons of armor plate were shipped by the Bethlehem Steel Company yesterday to Newport News for the battleship Illinois, in course of construction there.
Five hundred acres of woodland at York Furnace, York county, have been purchased by a New York man, who will graft the trees on the tract to raise big chestnuts.
K. C. Luther, general superintendent of the P. & R. C. & I. Co., accompanied by his wife will sail for Europe on Tuesday, July 18th. They expect to spend several months in the Old World.
The Carnegie Steel Co., of Pittsburgh, has agreed to deliver to the Russian government within the next 20 months 180,000 tons of steel rails at a price that is said to be the highest quoted this year.
There is some talk of the Frackville and Gilbert Electric Light, Heat and Power Company taking the matter of water into their own hands and laying pipes throughout Frackville to all residences.
Albert Schilling, of Frackville, who is in the miners' hospital at Ashland, suffering from concussion of the brain as a result of a runaway accident, is much improved today and the chances for his complete recovery are good.

Can't Get Enough Coal Miners.
Pittsburg, June 27.—President Patrick Dolan, of the United Mine Workers of the Pittsburgh district, says that every mine here needs from 25 to 100 additional miners, making from 4,500 to 5,000 men who could have steady employment for the entire year. He says the output of coal will be the greatest in the history of the trade, and that if the miners keep their contract with the operators this year, 15 cents more a ton can be had next year than the operators.

Want Eight Thousand Men.
In view of the great demand for coke in the Connellsville coke region and the extreme scarcity of labor it is said that it is the intention of the Frick Coke Company, now employing over 13,000 men, to import from the coal districts in the East and West about 8,000 men to make up the complement necessary to meet the demands for labor. Within the past few weeks many ovens which have been idle for years, have been fired up. Now ovens have been erected and hundreds more are in contemplation, necessitating more men.

Federal and State Courts in Conflict.
Walt City, Kan., June 27.—Deputy United States Marshal Briggs is here serving a restraining order, issued by United States District Judge Hook, on about 100 union miners, restraining them from in any manner interfering with the operations of the Central Coal and Coke company. Sheriff Wells, of Cherokee county, is also enjoined from interfering with the company in any lawful means they may employ to get men to work in the mines. This injunction brings the state and federal courts into direct conflict.

To Prosecute Oligomargaric Cases.
Rome, N. Y., June 27.—I. J. Evans, of this city, has been designated by Attorney General Davies to prosecute the oligomargaric cases brought by the state against Armour & Co. and other Chicago packers to recover penalties amounting to over \$2,000,000. The first move will be made early in July, when a hearing will take place in Albany before a referee.

Cleveland Tired of Baseball.
Cleveland, June 27.—Cleveland will not see any more League baseball this year. No more games will be played here after the series with Boston closes July 1. The cause, President Robinson says, is the refusal of nearly every club that has played here this season to return, owing to the poor attendance. The gate receipts have not averaged much over \$25 a day. All the Cleveland games will be transferred to other cities.

Hawkins For State Treasurer.
Washington, Pa., June 27.—The Washington county Republican committee met here yesterday and endorsed the action of the delegates to the county convention by passing resolutions favoring the nomination of Colonel A. L. Hawkins, of the Tenth Pennsylvania, for the nomination as state treasurer. The resolutions were received with cheers and applause and were carried without a dissenting voice.
