Brooklyn's Threatened Strike. Brooklyn, July 1.—A strike of Brooklyn rapid transit employees is imminent.

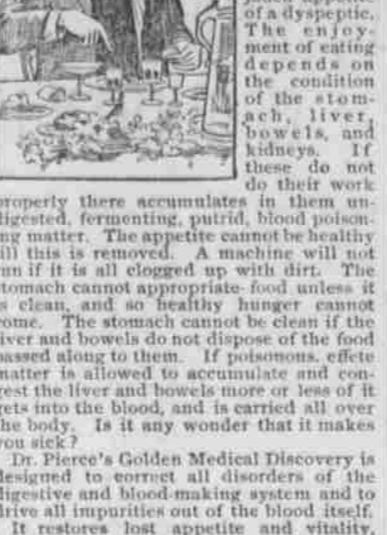

Washington, July 1.—The situation in the Philippines was discussed at the cabinet meeting yesterday, and general satisfaction was expressed in the administration's plans for the reinforcement of General Otis, which contemplate the reopening of active operations on a large scale when the rainy season closes, Sept. 15.
