





THE twenty-sixth annual report of the Insurance Department shows the condition on December 81 last of the fire and marine insurance companies doing business in Pennsylvania. The report is full of interesting statistics to persons interested in the insurance. business. The legislature not being in session, Commissioner Durham makes no recommendations. The following summary exhibits in a condensed form the entire business of stock companies of this state during the year 1898 : Income from fire premiums, \$14,588,102.26; income from harine and inland premiums, \$1.625,-384.55; total premium income, \$16,213,- One Negro Woman Killed and Four 486.81.






