

Congressman Steele Says "We Are Too Hig to Go to War Over the Alaskan Boundary"-Congressman Hull Opposes Yielding a Foot of the Territory

Seattle, Wash., July 12.—Congress-men Payne, Steele, Hull, Dalzell and Heatwole, who arrived here yesterday from Alaska, are very much impressed with their trip. Congressman Payne, who is a member of the joint high commission, refused to discuss the boundary question or the proposed modus vivendi. He anticipates no trouble over a settlement of the dis-

Congressman Steele said: "We are too big to ever go to war over the Alaskan boundary. The subject will in time shape itself and become set-Five-day tour to Gettysburg, Lursy, and tied. England never questioned the boundary from 1825 to 1867, when Seward purchased the country from Russia for the United States.

"We will not go behind the original treaty, by which we acquired all the rights of Russia, and therefore we will accept nothing other than the territory accorded us under that treaty."



## COLLEAGUES AT ODDS

Senator Chandler Testifies Against Senator Callinger

IN CIVIL SERVICE HEARING.

The fourth floor, and when discovered had made strong. of the civil service laws during the last campaign in this state. The specific charge is that Senator Gallinger, as chairman of the Republican state committee, distributed circulars appealing to Republican officeholders for con-

tributions to the campaign funds. Civil Service Commissioners J. B. Harlow and Mark S. Brewer, who arrived here from Washington Monday night, are in charge of the investiga-Hon. Attorney General Edwin G. Eastman, of Exeter, appeared as coun-sel for Senator Gallinger and Edwin H. Shannon, of Laconia, for Governor Busiel. Senator William E. Chandler was present as a witness. As the com-missioners have not authority to summon witnesses, they could do no more than request the presence of those whom they desired to testify. The principal feature of the session

was a long statement by Senator Chandler, previous to which Colonel Rufus N. Eliwell, collector of customs at Portsmouth, stated that he had received a circular letter from William F. Thayer, treasurer of the Republian state committee, asking for a contribution to carry on the commit-ee's work. Ossian D. Knox, postmas ter of Manchester, also testified, but he said that he saw no circular, and, furthermore, had not been asked to contribute to the 1898 campaign.

Senator Chandler then came forward with his statement, which he prefaced by a short history of his connection with political committees. He said he retired from the Republican national committee in 1884 and from the state committee in 1890. Senator Chandler

"I said to Senator Gallinger in 1895 and again in 1896 that he ought to leave the state committee for reasons connected with the civil service law, but he would not go. In 1898, much to my surprise, he took the chairmanship of the state committee. After I recovered from my surprise I went to him to endeavor to co-operate in the work of the campaign. We talked over the means of raising money, both agreeing that very little would be needed. We spoke of individuals, of nominees for state offices but not nominees for state offices, but nothing was said of federal officeholders. This was on Oct. 10. Between that time and Oct. 17 I heard that an assessment circular had been sent to federal officeholders. Governor Busiel asked me if I knew of this assessment. He said that he had reason to believe that a circular for assessment had been sent to officeholders, and he produced a circular which had been sent to state officers, and said that some of them had been sent to federal officeholders.

"We had a long conference, the rewe had a long conterence, the re-sult of which was that he said ho would complain to the civil service, commission unless some other way could be found to prevent these officers from being assessed. Accordingly Governor Busiel, with my knowledge, asked the commission about the terms Miss L. L. Clark, 917 Horton St. of the law. He came to me later and said that he had determined to make a complaint. In this I concurred

"I called on the commission when I went to Washington last fall and told them that I would be at their service. This is substantially all I wish to say. If I find that the federal officeholders who have been requested by the com-mission to appear here do not come, or if they come and do not testify, I shall tell the commission all I know about the matter."

At the conclusion of Senator Chandler's statement he exchanged some warm words with Senator Gallinger on his (Senator Chandler's) contribution to the party funds in 1894 and 1896. James O. Lyford, naval officer at

the port of Boston, was the last witness, and testified to receiving the circular from Treasurer Thayer. He also stated that the assessment circular was sent to federal officeholders in 1896, Ex-Governor Busiel detailed the circumstances attending his making complaint to the civil service commission last October and the correspondence between him and the commission.

Senator Gallinger asked the com-mission if he was to understand that the real complainant was ex-Governor Busiel or Senator Chandler, and was told he might draw his own conclu-

Governor Busiel read a long statement as to his reasons for action in the matter, saying that he was animated by a desire to see the civil ser-vice laws, in which he believed, enforced. He considered that the lavish use of money in elections was a menace to our national institutions. He was not actuated by any unfriendly feeling toward Senator Gallinger in prosecuting these charges and he had

no desire for "revenge,"
This investigation is held to allow the commissioners to examine the evi-dence and to decide if it warrants the further prosecution of the case. If they decide that it does, the United States authorities of the department of fustice will be called in.


