AN ORDINANCE

Regulating the Erection and Size of Bulk, Bay, Jut or Oriel Windows.

Bulk, Bay, Jut or Oriel Windows.

Section 1.—Be it ordained by the Town Council of the borough of Shenandoah, Penna, and it is hereby ordained by authority of the same, that on and after the passage of this ordinance no bulk, bay, jut or oriel window or windows projecting beyond the building line of any street shall be erected by any person or persons, firm or corporation, upon the first story of any building.

Section 2.—Bulk, bay, jut or oriel windows may after the passage of this ordinance, be erected upon any fronts, sides and rear ends of buildings extending over the pavements of the street from any story except the first within the lines drawn from the intersection of the party lines and building lines at right angles with the latter and to a distance of not more than two feet six inches beyond said building line.

Section 3.—Whenever it shall come to the knowledge of the Burgess that any person or persons, firm or corporation, erecting or causing to be erected, or are about to creet or cause to be erected, any bulk, bay, jut or oriel window, contrary to the provisions herein recited, it shall be his duty to forthwith remove the said bulk, bay, jut or oriel window about being constructed or erected or hereafter erected, or cause the same to be recuved, and the Burgess is hereby authorized and empowered to call to his assistance for the purpose aforesaid such number of persons as may under the circumstances be necessary to remove the said.
