

Epworth Leaguers In Convention. Indianapolis, July 20.—The fourth binennial international convention of the Epworth Leagues of the Methodist Episcopal church was opened this afternoon in the mammoth tent on the court house lawn and in Tomlinson Hall, across the street, the opening session of the league being held in the two simultaneously. Family Charged With Killing an

Adopted Asylum Girl. Lockport, N. Y., July 20.—After five weeks' deliberation the coroner's jury reached a verdict yesterday in the case of Sarah Mumford, the 17-year-old girl adopted by Henry Tripp, of Pen-dleton, from a Rochester asylum, whose dead body was found on the Central's tracks near Shawnee on June 9 at 2 a. m. The inquisition charges that she came to her death at the hands of Henry Tripp, his wife, Matilda, and his son, Loren. Tripp's daughter, Alva, is named as an accomplice, The Tripps are well to do people of Pendleton. Alva is a teacher and Loren is about 21 years old, and lives at home

The girl Sarah was adopted about six years ago. The neighbors claim she had to work hard and was badly The Tripps say that on the evening of June 8 she left the house bareheaded, and that they made a vain search for her. Next morning her re nains were found on the tracks four miles from the house. 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
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
