### Ballot Marking Question.

In the case of the election of an assessor in Gearbart township, Northumberland county, the Supreme Court in an opinion by Chief Justice Sterrett, decided a ballot marking question. The Election Board returned that

M. F. Gurlick, Republican, and Theodore Robison, Democrat, candidates for the office of Assessor, each rerequisite number of electors presented a petition to the Court of Quarter Sessions of the county setting out that eleven illegal votes had been counted for Gurlick which should have been rejected, because there was upon them a cross mark in the circle at the head of the Republican column and a cross mark in the square on the Democratic column opposite the name of a candidate for Supervisor.

The lower court sustained the allegation of illegality as to these ballots, and declared Robison to have been elected. Chief Justice Sterrett reverses this finding and affirms the correctness of the return of the Election Board. He points out that there but that the Republican ballot contained the name of but one candidate HOMEWARD BOUND WITH HER DEAD. for this office, and that the voter, while voting the whole Republican ticket by marking a cross in the circle, still had the right to vote for another Supervisor, because he was entitled to vote for candidates for all he offices that were to be filled.


