IRANSIENT MERCHANTS.

still Passed by the Legislature of Interest to Shenandoub.

The merchants of Shenandoah will be in erested in the following, found among the new pamphlet laws of Pennsylvania, new being circulated:

setting circulated;
An act to provide for the licensing of transient merchants in cities, boroughs and townships, and providing a penalty for failure to obtain the same.

Section 1. Be enacted, etc. That hereafter every person, whether principal or agent, en-tering into, beginning or desiring to begin a transient retail business in any city, borough or township of this Commonwealth for the or township of this Commonwealth for the rate of any goods, wares or merchandise whatsoever, whether the same shall be presented or hold forth to be bankrupt, assignees, or about to quit business, or of goods damaged by fire, water or otherwise, shall take out a license for the same from the proper authorites of the said city, borough or township.

The amount of such license in any city or borough shall be fixed by ordinance, duly passed by the Council of said city or borough, and shall not be less than \$25 nor exceed the sum of \$200, per month or fractional

ough, and shall not be less than \$25 nor exceed the sum of \$200, per month or fractional part thereof, to be paid to the treasurer of said city or borough; and the amount of such licesse in any township shall be the sum of \$25 ner month or fractional part thereof, to be paid to the county treasurer, for the use of the school fund of said township. Said license to be renowed monthy during the continuance of said sale, and upon failure of said person or persons so to secure such license, it, she or they shall be fined in a sum not less than \$100 nor more than \$200, to be collected as other fines are by law collectable, and in default of payment of said fines to be imprisoned in the jail of that city or county for a period not exceeding thirty days.

AN ORDINANCE.

Granting Permission to the Equitable Telephone Company, to Erect Poles, &c., in the Borough of

Shenandoah,

She. I.—Be it enseted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Shenandoah, Pa., and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, that permission is given to The Equitable Telephone Company, a corporation chartered under the laws of the Commonwesith of Pennsylvania, to plant and erect in the streets and alleys of the Borough of Shenandoah, Penna, any poles and wires which may be necessary for the transaction of the business of the said corporation, subject to the restrictions laid down in the following sections:

Sic. 2.—That no pole shall be of a height of less than 45 feet and shall be well painted and smoothly shaven 40 feet above the curb.

Sic. 3.—That no pole shall be creeted in any street or alley in front of any window, cellar door or coal chute, nor in front of any door entrance to any building or lot, nor in any manner that may obstruct or in any way hinder the convenient use of any building or lot of any street or alley in said Borough.

Sic. 4.—That the said Corporation shall farnish free of charge, and keep in repair a telephone instrument at Police Headquarters in said Borough and shall also furnish and keep in repair a telephone instrument in the Borough Council Chamber, or any other place that Council Chamber, or any other place that Council Chamber, or any other place that Council Chamber, or say other place that one of the said Borough and better or any other place that Council Chamber, or say other place that council purpose of the said purpose.
