

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### AMBASSADOR WHITE

Discusses the Peace Conference and the Monroe Doctrine.

NO CHANGE IN THAT DOUTRINE

Until the People of the United States Have Had an Opportunity to Study Any Proposed Modification in Ali Its Bearings.

London, July 27 .- The Hague correspondent of The Times reports a long conversation with Andrew D. White, United States ambassador at Berlin, and head of the American delegation. in which the ambassador, after refer-ring to the earnest desire of the American people for a comprehensive arbi-tration scheme, as proved by the constant petitions and resolutions of large meetings held in all parts of America since the conference has been sitting, Baid:

Such change cannot be made here by implications in a treaty made distinctly for another purpose, and it is important that there should be no doubt on this point.

Mr. White then referred to "the deep, almost religious conviction in tee a 25-cent bottle to prove satisfactory or the hearts of the American people He added, however, that the declara-United States policy exactly what it had been heretofore and would not in the slightest degree hamper the opera-tion of the arbitration plan. On the ontrary, the United States would fully and faithfully co-operate in the judicial settlement of international difficulties by means of the agency and machinery provided in the convention. The pass history of the United States abundantly shows, declared Mr. White, that they never manifested the slightest de-

sire to interfere with or hamper arbitration proceedings.

The ambassador then mentioned numerous cases of arbitrations arising nder four classes which might be regarded as involved in the Monroelsm declaration: First, between the Uni-ted States and European powers. Secbetween the United States and another American power. Third, be-tween two American powers, neither eing the United States. Fourth, be ween an American power other than

he United States and a foreign power.
"In every instances," said Mr. White,
'the United States has regarded these arbitrations as promoting peace, and therefore there is nothing in our history to warrant the idea that our attitude would be hostile to any settlement possible under this convention."



Although there was no disturbance in the neighborhood at the time, it is stated, the conductor, who stood on the front platform with his motorman, carried a re-volver in his hand. Suddenly it was discharged and young Wright gave a cry of pain. The bullet had entered his right leg just below the groin. The car ran on to Euclid avenue and run into the barn. When the police arrived the conductor was not to be

The storm center of the strike has, The storm center of the strike has, according to the authorities, settled in Brooklyn, a suburb connected with Cleveland by a long high bridge. Yesterday at noon 150 employes of the Born Steel Range company blockaded a car on the bridge and dragged the motorman and conductor from their posts, inflicting with their fists and other weapons injuries more painful than serious. Soldiers on guard at the barn, about a mile away, hurried to the scene, but the rioters had taken refuge In the factory which stands under the approach to the bridge. The factory was surrounded and the premises searched, but there was no clew by which the guilty ones could be picked and conductor to move the car, most of the windows of which were broken by

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
