AN ORDINANCE.

Granting Permission to the Equitable Telephone Company, to Erect Poles, &c., in the Borough of Shenandoah.

Sec. 1.—Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Shenandoah, Pa., and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, that permission is given to the Equitable Telephone Company, a corporation chartered by the laws of the State of Pennsylvania, to plant and erect in the streets and alleys of the Borough of Shenandoah, poles, wires and other apparatus necessary for the transmission of the business of the said corporation, subject to the restrictions laid down in the following sections.

Sec. 2.—That no pole shall be of a height of less than 45 feet and shall be well painted and smoothly shaved 40 feet above the curb.

Sec. 3.—That no pole shall be erected in any street or alley in front of any window, cellar door or coal chute, nor in front of any door entrance to any building or lot, nor in any manner that may obstruct or in any way hinder the convenient use of any building or lot of any street or alley in said Borough.

Sec. 4.—That the said Corporation shall furnish free of charge, and keep in repair a telephone instrument at Public Headquarters in said Borough and shall also furnish and keep in repair a telephone instrument in the Borough Council Chamber and in any other place that Council may decide upon.

Sec. 5.—That the right shall be reserved to the said Borough to use at any time, any or all of said poles for the purpose of its fire alarm system and the top cross arm of every pole erected by said Corporation shall be reserved for said purpose.

Sec. 6.—That the provisions of this ordinance shall not be effective until the same shall have been accepted by the Board of Directors of said Corporation, such acceptance entered upon the minutes and a transcript thereof certified by the Secretary of said Corporation to the Board of Directors of said Corporation and filed with the Clerk of Council. If said right of way is not accepted within three months from date hereof, the same to be null and void.

Sec. 7.—That all privileges granted under this ordinance shall cease and determine unless the plan is in operation within one year from the date of the acceptance as aforesaid.

Sec. 1.—Be it enacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Shenandoah, Pa., and it is hereby enacted and ordained by the authority of the same, that permission is given to the Equitable Telephone Company, a corporation chartered by the laws of the State of Pennsylvania, to plant and erect in the streets and alleys of the Borough of Shenandoah, poles, wires and other apparatus necessary for the transmission of the business of the said corporation, subject to the restrictions laid down in the following sections.

Sec. 2.—That no pole shall be of a height of less than 45 feet and shall be well painted and smoothly shaved 40 feet above the curb.

Sec. 3.—That no pole shall be erected in any street or alley in front of any window, cellar door or coal chute, nor in front of any door entrance to any building or lot, nor in any manner that may obstruct or in any way hinder the convenient use of any building or lot of any street or alley in said Borough.

Sec. 4.—That the said Corporation shall furnish free of charge, and keep in repair a telephone instrument at Public Headquarters in said Borough and shall also furnish and keep in repair a telephone instrument in the Borough Council Chamber and in any other place that Council may decide upon.

Sec. 5.—That the right shall be reserved to the said Borough to use at any time, any or all of said poles for the purpose of its fire alarm system and the top cross arm of every pole erected by said Corporation shall be reserved for said purpose.
