> Fearful Brutality in the Caucasus. London, July 29.—The Berlin corre-spondent of The Daily News telegraphs a story taken from a Tiflis paper of incredible brutality in the works of a Belgian iron company in the Caucasus. According to the story a number of lads who were suspected of theft were horribly tortured by the Belgian director and six Belgian fore-men, with a view of forcing a confession. The lads' eyelids were pierced with needles, their bodies savagely belabored until they lost consciousness, their teeth extracted, large stones forced into their mouths and their fore-heads hammered with the butts of revolvers. The public prosecutor is investigating the affair.

Four Killed in Train Wreck. Halifax, N. S., July 29.—Four men were crushed to death, seven seriously injured and a number slightly hurt in the wreck of a construction train on the Midland railway in Hanis county yesterday afternoon. A train of flat cars was proceeding slowly along some new track when one of the center cars jumped the rails and the others be-hind piled on top of it. There were 25 or 30 men on the train. All those on board the car that first left the track, four in number, were instantly killed. One or two of those injured are in a dangerous condition.

Sec. 1.—Be it emacted and ordained by the Town Council of the Borough of Shenandoah, Pa., and it is hereby emacted and ordained by the authority of the same, that permission is given to The Equitable Telephone Company, a corporation chartered under the laws of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to plant and erect in the streets and alleys of the Borough of Shenandoah, Penna, any poles and wires which may be necessary for the transaction of the business of the said corporation, subject to the restrictions laid down in the following sections:

SEC. 2.—That ne pole shall be of a height of less than 45 feet and shall be well painted and smoothly shaven 40 feet above the curb.

SEC. 3.—That no pole shall be erected in any street or alley in front of any window, cellar door or ceal cluste, nor in front of any deer entrance to any building or lot, nor in any manner that may obstruct or in any way hinder the sonvenient use of any building or lot of any street or alley in said Borough.

SEC. 4.—That the said Corporation shall furnish free of charge, and keep in repair a telephone instrument at Police Headquarters in said Borough and shall also furnish and keep in repair a telephone instrument in the Borough Council Chamber, or any other place that Council may decide upon.

SEC. 5.—That the right shall be reserved to the said Borough to use at any time, any or all of said purpose.

SEC. 6.—That the provisions of this ordinance shall not be effective muilt in the action of the said buryone.

rected by said Corporation shall be reserved for said purpose.

Sec. 6.—That the provisions of this ordinance shall not be effective until the same shall have been accepted by the Board of Directors of said Corporation, such acceptance entered upo the minutes and a transcript thereof certified by their President and Secretary over the seal of said Corporation and filed with the Clerk of Council. If said right of way is not accepted within three months from date hereof, the same to be null and well.

Sec. 7.—That all privileges granted under this critinance shall cease and determine unless the plant is in operation within one year from the date of its acceptance as aforesaid.
