At Longacre square the effigy was placed on top of a barrel, kerosene in liberal quantities vas applied and the doctor applied the The pile binzed flercely. The spectators cheered and loudly called on Dr. Crowe to make a speech. Dr. Crowe bitterly attacked Mr. Astor, but his speech was interrupted by a report that the police were coming, and the speaker mysteriously disappeared.

TO FIGHT THE SMALLPOX.

Condition of Affairs in and About Pittsburg Alerus Health Officials. Pittsburg, Aug. 5.—The seriousness of the situation about Pittsburg re-garding the outbreak of smallpox has now reached a point when the most decisive measures will be resorted to in order to stamp out the disease. Dr. Benjamin C. Lee, of Philadelphia, secretary of the state board of health, and Dr. W. W. Welch, superintendent of the municipal hospital of Philadelphia, who arrived in Pittsburg yesterday to confer with the health authorities here regarding the best methods to fight the plague, declare that there is danger of an epidemic unless the people in the stricken districts greater disposition to assist the au-thorities to check the smallpox.

At East Pittsburg 15 well developed ases have been discovered, and at Homestead 10 cases. The experts say all the cases are of a mild type, but if the disease is not stamped out before cold weather sets in there is no telling how malignant it may develop. Wholesale vaccination is advised as a precaution and further recommendations will be made when the investigation of the county has been completed.


