Here are three regiments which after a year's service, largely on the firing line in Luzon and in the trenches, return to their homes with a combined mortality of less than 180. All saw more or less hard fighting and marching. It was the Pennsylvanians who stood the brunt of a Spanish night sortie during a storm. The Nebraskans and Oregonians were in the thick of the engagements reaching from Manila to Majolos and San Fernando, and passed through several ugly ambuscades. But they are back home looking well and with ranks but little reduced when comparison is made with former wars.

In the face of figures so significant it is useless to say that these regiments have not been intelligently handled and well cared for. They are healthy, make a fine appearance on parade and their mortality list is small. They have worked steadily, fought bravely and seen, some hardships, but all this is in the line of a soldier's duty. Those who do not count upon such an experience should not enter the service. Many a regiment in the civil war returned with less than 200 men. The regular army in that struggle was literally shot out of existence.

When the "yellow" interviewers circulate in these returning regiments to collect material to back up the claim that the war is a failure the men in the ranks might well point to their long line to show how well their comfort and health has been guarded, securing them the vantage ground in fighting and preserved them from

disaster. These regiments are not in the shape that bespeaks an lucom petent administration.

Again the Fleet New Yacht Shows Her Superiority. Greenport, L. I., Aug. 9.—The first run of the New York Yacht club yesterday, from New London out into the sound as far as Watch Hill and back to Gardiners bay, was one of the most successful in the club's history. Not only was the day an ideal one, with a great wholesale breeze from the west, which held through from the start to finish, but the club watched with pride the magnificent run of the new of the fleet, Columbia, which fairly dis tanced every other eacht with the ex-ception of Defender, and she, too, was defeated by 4 minutes and 19 seconds

In a 30 mile race.

The old cup defender Vigilant was beaten by the two fivers nearly an hour, but much of this was no doubt due to the fortunate run of Columbia and Defender along the Fisher's Island shore, while the rest of the fleet kept over on the other side of the sound. The Amorita was in the schooner class.

Over 50 yachts crossed the line at New London and rearly all finished in Cardiners bay, although some of them did not get in until toward night.

By far the greatest event of the day was the magnificent seven miles run of Columbia from Fisher's Island to Great Gull Island, during which she averaged close to a 13 knot gait.
