Guagua and Santa Arita New Within Our Lines.

THE FILIPINOS' PORTS CLOSED.

Vessels Under Poreign Fings Connot Trade With the Rebels-Our Loss in Wednesday's Fighting Five Killed and Twenty-nine Wounded.

Manila, Aug. 11 .- Official reports received here from the scene of the recent fighting with the Filipinos say that yesterday was spent in reconnaissances, during which the American troops found a few of the enemy, but there were no engagements of importance. A battaiion of the Seventeenth infantry, under Major O'Brien, ad vanced very close to Angeles. The major reports that there are about 250 insurgents there. A battallon of the Twelfth infantry made a reconnaissance in the direction of Porac, but the enemy there scattered. The main body of the American army is at Calulum. The line has been immaterially changed since the advance was stopped on Wednesday, and now includes the towns of Guagua and Santa Agita,

Major General Otis yesterday issued an order closing the ports in the hands of the insurgents to inter-island traffic. Aguinaldo Issued a decree July 24, dated from Tarlac, closing the insurgent ports to vessels flying the American flag and inviting vessels under other flags to visit them. Vessels under foreign flags cannot traffic with these ports without running the block-

The gunboats Concord, Yorktown, Callao and Pampanga bombarded San Fernando Tuesday. The Filipinos re-plied with cannon and musketry for an hour, and then fled to the hills, the gunboats firing on them with their machine guns until the rebels disap-peared. The bombardment was continued for some time afterwards and many houses were riddled and destroyed, but the town was not set on fire The gunboats did not land men. The

rebel losses are not known. The United States transport Sheridan sailed for home yesterday with 667 men of the South Dakota regiment, 996 of the Minnesota regiment and 205 men discharged from various organi-

IOWANS IN THE BATTLE.

The Fifty-first Saw Some of Its Hardest Fighting on Wednesday. Des Moines, Aug. 11.—The Des Moines News has received the following cablegram, dated Manila, from Colonel J. C. Loper, commanding the Fifty-first Iowa regiment, in reference to Wednesday's battle: "The Fiftyfirst Iowa saw some of the hardest fighting it has encountered during the present campaign. Our force advanced several miles from San Fernando, wad-ing through deep mud and fighting almost constantly, the Filipinos retiring in considerable confusion, but maintaining a steady fire. The engagement was general, 6,000 of the enemy being engaged, while General MacArthur had, in additionto our regiment, the Ninth and Twelfth regiments and new Thirty-sixth, part of the Seventeenth regiment and a cavalry troop. Our advance was assisted by the artillery, 15 guns being employed. One battalion of the Fifty-first accompanied the ar tillery in a successful movement in the direction of Mexico, the regiment advancing with the main body of troops toward Angeles. The Ameri-can loss was severe, several killed and about 25 wounded.

GENERAL OTIS' REPORTS.

Five of Our Men Were Killed in Wed-nesday's Battle. Washington, Aug. 11.—General Otis yesterday cabled the war department the following report of Wednesday's

engagement: 'Mac Arthur's movement yesterday very successful; serves to clear coun try rear and left and right of insurgents; has advanced north to Calulet, six miles from San Fernando, whence he is now reconnoitering; his casual-ties five killed and 29 wounded. Officers wounded: Major Braden, Cap-tain Abernethy, Thirty-sixth volunteers, leg and arm, moderate; Lieu-tenant Williams, Fifty-first Iowa, thigh, moderate. MacArthur reports the insurgent loss 100 killed and some 300 wounded. They were rapidly driven northward, and last evening apparent-

ly abandoned Porac line, where they blew up powder works.

"Captured letters from a high insurgent authority exhorting inhabitants to hold out a little longer; that European recognition will be granted by Aug. 31, and that the present United States administration will be overthrown.
