Jacksonville, Aug. 19 .- According t a Miami dispatch the town of Red Bay, on the Island of Andros, 20 miles southwest of Nassau, was swept away in the recent tropical hurricane and about 300 lives lost. An eye witness estimates the loss of life on the island at fully 600. Scattered through the wreck of houses at Red Bay after the storm subsided, he said, were hundreds of the corpses of persons of all ages and classes. Captain Dillon, of the steamer Cocooa, who first gave the information to the correspondent, says the wind blow at the rate of 90 miles an hour at Nassau with occasional gusts which reached a velocity of 105 miles an hour.
