THE KILLING OF FRENCH OFFICERS

By Members of An African Expedition of Fellow Countrymen. Paris, Aug. 22.—M. Decrais, minister of the colonies, has received a dispatch from the governor general of French West Affrica conferming the story of the killing of Lieutenant Colonel Klobb and Lieutenant Meunier, by members of a French expedition, under the conduct of Captains Voulet and Chanoine, in the French Soudan.

It appears that on news being received of the barbarity of the Voulet-Chanoine mission towards the natives on the march toward Lake Chad, the Dupny ministry instructed Lieutenant Colonel Klobb, who was at Kayes, to proceed with a column, overtake the mission, investigate the charges and assume command, On July 14 the Klobb party overtook the mission at Zimber near Domanger, Lleutenant Colonel Klobb sent word to Captain Voulet, who replied that he would shoot him if he advanced. Notwithstanding this threat, Klobb advanced and made himself known to Voulet, who ordered him peremptorily to stop. This order was disregarded and when the Klobb party was within a hundred and fifty metres of Voulet's troops, the latter, on his order, fired three volleys, which were followed by independent firing. Lieutenant Meunier fell dead, Lieutenant Colonel Klobb, wounded in the leg by the first volley, was dispatched by be-ing shot in the head. Voulet then ordered a bayonet

NINE MEN DROWNED!

Capsized in Mantia Containg QAR United States Soldiers. Ithaca, N. Y., Aug. 22.-Commissioner Jacob G. Schurman reached Ithaca yesterday. Since leaving Manlla he has, he says, stendily refused to discuss Philippine affairs, although he has been besieged by reporters everywhere, Chicago reporters having gone as far west as the Rocky mountains to interview him. However, he now makes the following statement:

"First, the United States having assumed sovereignty over the Philippine falands by virtue of a treaty of peace with Spain, the chief executive of the republic is engaged in establishing that sovereignty. The issue today is not a commercial one, although the natural resources of the Philippine islands are of great value, and wait only American capital for the development. Nor is the question of political expediency or party politics, although in its collateral branch there may be aspects on which political parties may properly divide, but the question today is neither one of commercial advantage nor of partisan politics. It is a purely moral question. The vital issue is the honor of the na-tion, the protection of loyal Filipinos, and the fulfillment of our obligations to the nations of the world involved in our acceptance of sovereignty.
"Second, the means and agencies for

the accomplishment of this end must be determined by the president, and it is well to bear in mind that the president understands the situation better than any one else can possibly do, inasmuch as he is in receipt of informa-tion from a variety of sources, civil and military, and has the judgm experts upon the facts reported. I have no doubt the president will soon ef-fect a solution of the Philippine problem which will be entirely satisfactory to the American people. To his states-manship and tried ability we may entrust the issue with perfect confiden
