The Filipinos.

Gen. Irving Hale, who has just returned from Manila to his home in Denver, expresses the firmest of convictions that the Filipinos are now and long will be incapable of selfgovernment, but nevertheless he speaks of them with kindly appreciation as a people of many good qualities and presenting material on which the influences of civilization may hopefully be exerted. .

While he found them treacherous enemies in the field, he is disposed to ascribe their frequent violations of the laws of war to their terrible experfences under Spanish rule rather than to any inherent viciousness. "I like them," said the General, soon after his arrival, "and I consider them a promising people. They are cheerful, good-natured, provident and hospitable. The better cineses sire well educated, and even the best doctors did me no good, though I took poorest of the Filipino servants in Manila write and speak a little Spanish. Even in the laterior most of the natives are hardly savages. They keep house after a fashion, in their small bamboo buts; are kind to their families, and very fond of their wives and children. The Filipino woman is more on an equality with the Fiffpino man than is the case in

Dewey's Washington Reception. Washington, Sept. 6.—Preparations for the reception of Admiral Dewey in this city are rapidly assuming shape, and from the program, even in its present incomplete condition, the celebra-tion will be one of the most noteworthy that has ever occurred in Washington. The admiral's reception here will be largely in the nature of an official function, as its central feature will be the presentation of the magnificent sword voted to him by congress. The celebration will take place on the night of Oct. 2 or 3. There will be an imposing parade at night and a general illumination of the city, and the procession will be reviewed by President McKinley and Admiral Dewey. The governors of all the states and territories have been invited to be present.
