Pottsville, Sept. 9.-The plant of the Pottsville Iron and Steel Company has been sold by H. P. Brown, of Philadelphia, to a syndicate of capitalists in that city, of whom Mesers. William M. Shelmerdine, N. Clarence Miller, John W. Grange, Pilling and Crane are a part. The plant was sold to Mr. Brown

at public sale last July.

Several holders of the bonds of the company were settled with yesterday at the rate of 20 cents on the dollar. The total issue of these bonds amounted to \$217,000. To-day the Miners' National Bank, which held \$83,-000, accepted a check on the Manufacturers' Bank of Philadelphia, covering \$16,000, in full payment of its holdings; the Pennsyl-vania National Bank took \$3,000 for its \$10. 000, and William L, and Henry Sheafer the same percentage for the \$6,000 of honds held by them. The Atkins family are holders of \$102,000, and the Safe Deposit Bank \$10,000.
