SIX DAYS PER WEEK.

A Full Number of Working Days for Miners for the Next Three Months.

The collieries of the Philadelphia & Reading Coal and Iron Company worked today, which makes six days that they have been in operation this week. Unless orders come to the contrary the same program will be followed next week.

The months of September, October and November promise to be very good ones for the miners of the Schuylkill coal region. From what is a prominent Coal & Iron Company official this morning, it is altogether probable that the collieries will work a full week until the close of November.

The demand for anthracite coal continues strong and steady and the only difficulty seems to be to get sufficient cars to get the "black diamonds" to the several big market points. At present the miners are working but three quarters time per day. It is said that if it were possible to get sufficient car service the miners could work full time.

At all events there has been a big change for the better this year all through the anthracite coal region for the benefit of the miner, over the deplorable condition of affairs which existed last year. The anticipation of steady work has given encouragement to thousands of miners and their families in this county.

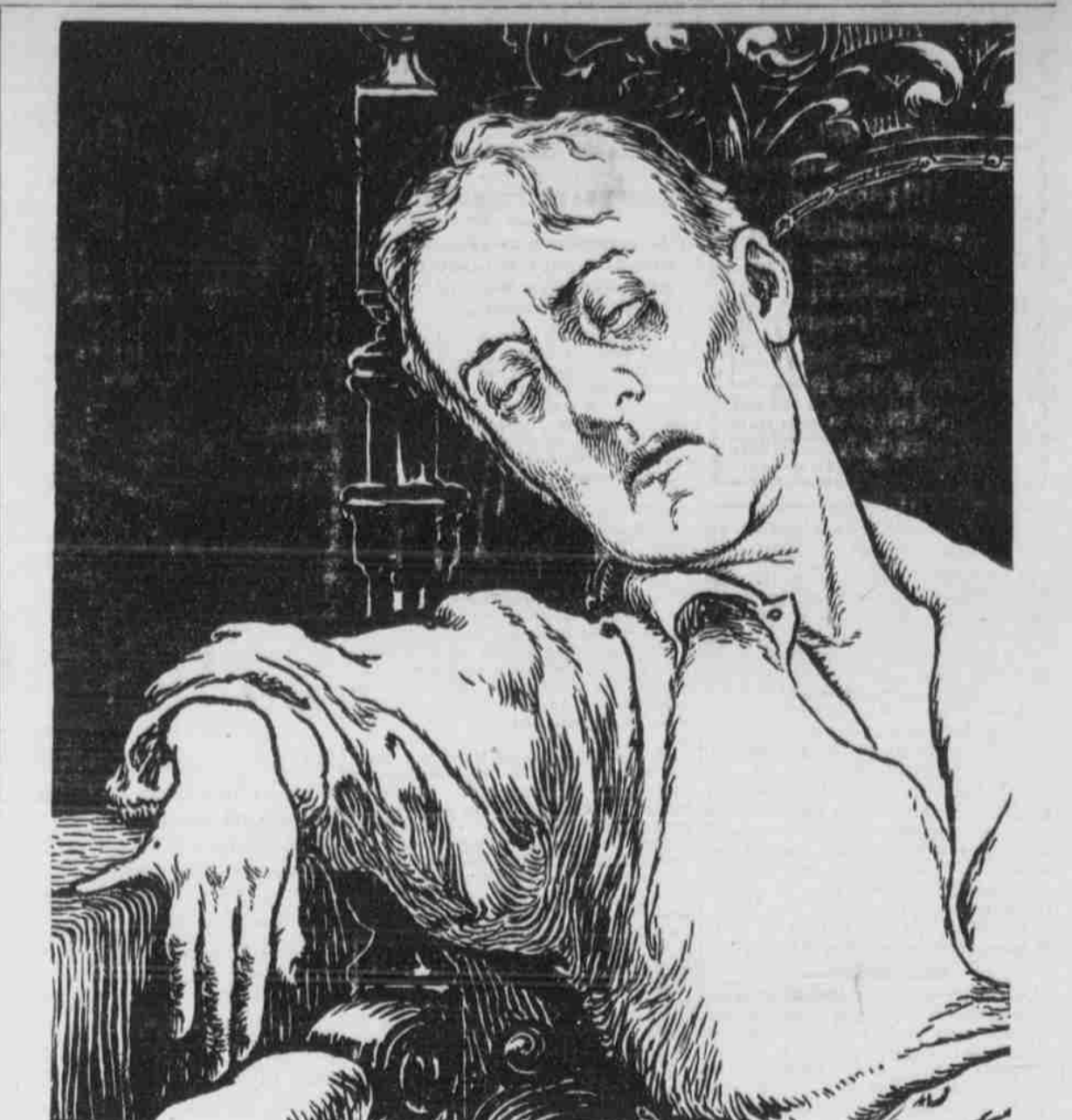
