

# TWO NOTABLE DEATHS.

Congressman Ermentrout, of the Ninth Pennsylvania District,

A VICTIM OF THROAT PARALYSIS.

Charles A. Pillsbury, the Famous Minneapolis Miller, Succumbs to Heart Trouble After Being Treated by Em-Inent European Physicians,

Reading, Pa., Sept. 18.-Hon. Daniel Ermentrout, who was elected in November last to his sixth term in congress from the Ninth district (Berks and Lebigh counties), died at his home here yesterday. He was 62 years of age. On Thursday last, while at dinner, a piece of meat lodged in his throat and a physician had to be called to save him from strangulation. Paralysis of the parts affected follow ed, but his death was unexpected. Mr. Ermentrout is survived by a widow and two children, Fitz Daniel Ermentrout, a member of the bar here, and Miss Adelaide Tonise Ermentrout

Daniel Ermentrout was born Reading in 1837. He was admitted to the bar in 1859, filled the office of dis-trict attorney from 1862 to 1865, that of city solicitor from 1867 to 1870 and state senator from 1873 to 1880. In 1880 he was elected to congress and was re-elected for three following terms, thus serving continuously from 1881 to 1889. He was again elected in 1896 to the Fifty-fifth congress and last year was re-elected to the Fifty-sixth congress. Mr. Ermentrout was prominent in the national councils of the Democratic party for years, and was a leading fig-ure and participant in state conven-tions. For 35 years he was a leader in Berks county politics.

DEATH OF A NOTED MILLER.

Charles A. Pillsbury, Founder of the

Famous Minneapolis Mill.
Minneapolis, Sept. 18.—Charles A. Pillsbury, the well known miller, died In this city yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock of heart trouble. On account of poor health Mr. Pillsbury went to Europe Dec. 1, 1898, and returned the middle of June. While abroad he consulted with eminent physicians London, Paris, Vienna and Berlin and returned to New York apparently much improved. The physicians agreed that he was suffering from heart trouble, caused by an enlargement of the stomach, which in turn was due to overwork and insufficient physical exercise. After reaching home be gradually grew stronger and seemed to be in a fair way to totally recover his health. A week ago he took a trip to southern Minnesota, but on his return he suffered from nausea. was then that dangerous symptoms de-

Charles Alfred Pillsbury was born at Warner, N. H., Oct. 3, 1842. He graduated from Dartmouth college at the age of 21, having partly supported himself by teaching. For six years later he engaged in mercantile pursuits in Montreal, and on Sept. 12, 1866, he married Miss Mary A. Stinson, of Goffatown, N. H. After coming to Minneapolis, in 1869, Mr. Pillsbury bought an interest in a small flour mili at St. Anthony Falls. He applied himself to learning the milling busi-ness, and within the next few years worst cases relieved immediately.
