## A CENTRALIA HERO.

Thomas Langan, Who Saw Active Service in the Philippine Campaign.

Deeply browned by the burning suns of a foreign land; clad in the humoristic blue of Uncle Sam's brave boys, and suffering from wounds received in warfare with a treacherous foe, Thomas Langan arrived at his home at Centralia, on Saturday, after months of absence, and was given a warm and most cordial welcome.

Mr. Langan was a member of the Fourth Cavalry Troop, U. S. A., which is now doing service in the Philippines, and has just been given an honorable discharge from the service.

He spent the past several weeks in an hospital at San Francisco, Cal., recuperating from wounds received in the service. He claims that he was the first American soldier wounded in the campaign against the Filipinos, and he bears the marks of nine bullets upon his person.

Mr. Langan was in town on Saturday and called on the Naughton family, bringing them a message from their son, Harry P., who is now on his way home from the Philippines, and who did signal service during the war when he was attached to the army telegraph department.

The title page was "Emperied by me, William Caxton, Westminster, the yere of our Lord, MCCCCCLXV."
