OFFICIALS say that if traffic continues to grow in October and November as it has in the last thirty days a car famine will exist on every road in the country.

The national organization is bound under the rules of the order to take action in the matter within thirty days, but before the expiration of that time it is thought that a special session of the Council will be held to order the per capita tax paid under protest.

According to a dispatch from Seranton, the scene of the recent rupture, it appears that had the national officers deferred hasty action, trouble might have been averted.

It is strongly maintained by many delegates that the charge of insubordination was premature, and that when the matter is presented to the national judiciary in the proper light the decision is bound to be in favor of the State Council.

This view, says the Lebanon Report, is strengthened by the fact that the charges were not specified, and unless the national officers can show good cause for their action they will not be sustained in suspending the charter before the convention had finally adjourned.

Charges have been made that the State Council officers and the National officers had an understanding and that the present trouble was foreseen. The outcome of the matter is being watched with the greatest interest all over the United States, as Pennsylvania is the great Junior Mechanic stronghold of the country.

Some of the more radical members of the order point out that the State Council is an incorporated body, and can operate under the title of the Junior Order United American Mechanics without consulting the National Council, and as the Pennsylvania membership comprises nearly two-thirds of the whole National body it is a question in their minds whether it is not advisable to remain independent.

NO STRIKE IN HAVANA.

Military Power to Prevent a Rising of the Wage Workers. GEN. LUDLOW'S PROCLAMATION. He Warns the Workmen Against Following the Lead of "Self Seeking Demagogues," and Declares He Can Find Room For 2,000 Prisoners.

Havana, Sept. 27.—Owing to the police breaking up the meeting Monday night which had been called by the general committee of the labor unions for the purpose of deciding whether a general strike should be ordered, the question has not yet been settled. These unions had originally intended to have held a meeting at the requisite 24 hours' notice, as required by law, and the 2,000 men who had assembled were therefore dispersed and the headquarters of the strikers were occupied by the police and some secretaries.

Work on the wharves has been paralyzed, owing to the action of the stevedores and wharfmen, who refuse to allow operations of any kind to be carried on. The cartmen, coachmen and omnibus men, however, are still working.

"There will not be a general strike," said General Ludlow last evening. "I have sufficient assurances to satisfy me on that point. Chief Governor Rivera says the matter is out of his hands and entirely within the jurisdiction of the military authorities. To all intents and purposes the city is under martial law. The civil authorities will do their utmost to co-operate and will do nothing to embarrass the military government. Governor Rivera declares that if it devolved upon him to settle the dispute he would not have to use force. When Chief of Police Cardenas asked him for instructions his reply was that the chief should carry out the orders of the military authorities, although in the same breath he declared that he disapproved of the policy of those orders. General Ludlow says that if it should be necessary he can find room at the presidio for 1,000 prisoners, and at Cabanas for as many more. Where all the rights of citizens are at stake he considers that existing military power should supersede any legal technicality.

The military governor has issued a long proclamation, which is in part as follows: "The present juncture, when certain irresponsible and selfish individuals are seeking to destroy the peaceful industries of the city and to mislead the workmen into a general conspiracy to paralyze the life and movement of the community, it behooves me, for the interest of all concerned and for the immediate representative of the United States government, to publish a word of warning."

"The United States of America is pledged to the establishment in Cuba of a stable and orderly government. A pledge made alike to Cubans and to the world will surely be fulfilled. Every endeavor will be made to inculcate in the minds of the government, the foundation of which is true, self respecting liberty. Modern civilization demands an enduring respect for law and the rights and liberties of others."

"The workmen of Havana are being tempted toward a fatal step, which will not only wreck the exercise of liberty and the enjoyment of the rights of man for an indefinite period. At the instigation of a few self seeking demagogues, backed by a more numerous element that prefers idleness to labor, and excitement of any kind to the calmer life of thrift and industry, the workmen of Havana are urged to forego all labor, to extinguish the lights that protect property and discourage crime, to close the bake shops that furnish food and, if that could be accomplished, to cut off the water supply. Meaningless and unproductive occupations are to be abandoned, industry is to perish and food is to fail."

"Upon whom would this punishment fall? Who would be at once, and fatally, the victims of this iniquitous conspiracy? Who but the poor, the destitute and the sick? Who but the ailing children of the family, the weak and helpless? Who but the ignorant and destitute, thousands of whom exist in Havana, whose daily resources are essential to their sustenance? Should there be a strike within 48 hours the cries of hunger and wails of the famished, these from multitudes whose sole fault it is that they are the wives and children of men who have been driven to sacrificing them without thought or reason."

"It is known to the authorities that but a small proportion of the workmen are in sympathy with the movement and that the majority have been coerced into assent. Let there be no misunderstanding as to the outcome. Order will be maintained. Violence and tumult will be crushed. Where so much is at stake there will be no hesitation in applying such remedial and correctional measures as may be necessary to preserve the peace and safety of the city. No man can be compelled to work against his will. But if he can work, yet will not, he is only a vagrant and a burden, and he must take the responsibility for his own acts and the needless and innumerable sufferings which he imposes upon his kindred, as well as upon the public."

Boys Strikers at Bridgeton. Bridgeton, N. J., Sept. 27.—Another strike occurred at the Cumberland glass works last night. The boys employed there demanded the discharge of Joseph Johnson, a colored watchman. Johnson later they charge, brutally assaulted one of the boys because he refused to leave the yard, and Johnson fired at the strikers. The boy was badly injured. Johnson left the grounds, and a constable is hunting for him. The strike of the boys forced the blowers to quit. The Cumberland recently became a union shop, after a long strike of the workmen.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—The committee which will act as special secretary of Joseph Johnson Affairs Mariscal, representing President Diaz, as Chicago's guest during the fall festival left here in a special train over the Santa Fe today. Governors Sayers of Texas, Otero of Mexico, Thomas of Colorado, Stanley of Kansas and Stevens of Missouri are expected to join the delegation upon its return. The committee expects to arrive at Mexico next Sunday, to turn homeward Tuesday, and to reach Chicago Oct. 7.

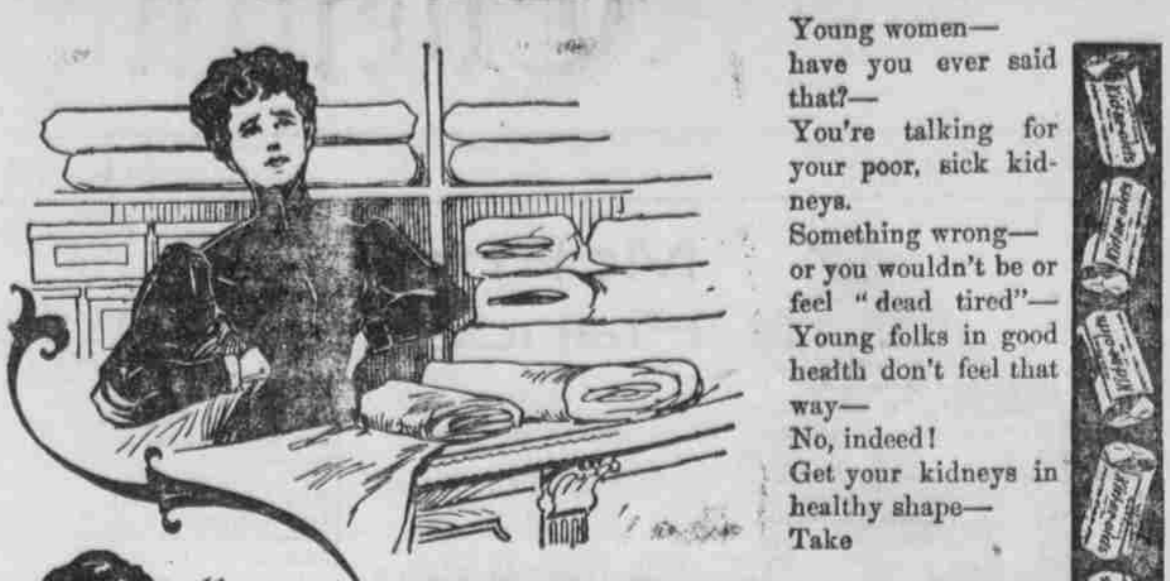
