London, Sept. 27.-The Transvaal crisis presents few fresh features. It is increasingly probable that parlia-ment will meet about the middle of Ment will meet about the middle of October, and it is again asserted that General Sir Redvers Buller, who is to have supreme command of the British forces in South Africa in the event of hostilities, will start for the Cape on Oct. 7. Nothing, however, has been officially made known on either point.

When the dis-patch boat was a mile away it began firing an admiral's salute of 13 guns. The Dolphin anchored near the Olympla, and Rear Admiral Sampson and his staff went on board. They were received by Admiral Dewey, Captain Lamberton, Lieutenant Brumby and the officer of the deck, the full marine guard and band being paraded. The officers went to the admiral's cabin. Rear Admiral Sampson said that he was delighted with the evident good health of Admiral Dewey and told the admiral that he looked much younger than most of the portraits made him out to be. Rear Admiral Sampson remained on board for more than an hour, and after returning to the Dolphin he said: "Admiral Dewey li delighted, as is everyone on board, to reach his native shores again. He h much moved by the great kindness and enthusiasm of the people, though shrinking from too much curv-mony and public display, feels deeply the regard of which these are the out-

### A "NAPOLEON OF FINANCE."

He Gets Ten Years' Imprisonment For Crooked Transactions.

Kansas City, Sept. 27.—Leonard B.
Imboden, president of the Planters'
bank, a "wild cat" concern suppressed by the state officials several months ago, was yesterday found guity in the criminal court of forg-ing a draft for \$15,000, with which he hoped to get a faise credit for his bank, and was sentenced to ten years in the penitentiary. Imboden here from Texas, where he was par-doned by Governor Hogg after serv-

ing two years for forgery.
Imboden is one of the remarkable criminals of the day. For years he lived apparently without resources, attempting to promote banking, cattle and real estate deals in Kansas, Texas and New Mexico of such magnitude that they made the ordinary man gasp with wonder. In every prospectus he claimed to have prominent Chicago, St. Louis, Philadelphia and New York trust companies behind him. The act which led to an examination of imboden's bank and his final arrest was in accepting a deposit from a wealthy local cattle man whose confidence he had gained by letters apparently from eastern enpitalists saying his credit was the best.

Imboden was born in Texas. He is a great grandnephew of General Im-boden, who served under General Washington during the revolutionary war, is a cousin of General Imboden, late of the Confederate army, and his parents, both of whom are now dead, were looked upon as among the very first families in the south.
