CHANGING A ROAD. The Brandonville Road Viewers Have Begun Their Work.

Hon. M. C. Watson, John P. Boehm and George Stauffer, the viewers recently appointed to view the route for the proposed new road between Kelly Run colliery and Reichert's hotel at Brandonville, held their first view yesterday at the hotel referred to, and heard a number of parties interested. A large number of residents of Union and East Union townships were present, and all appeared to favor the proposed change in the road.

The act of 1897 fixed the maximum grade at three degrees, but that act is not yet in force, for the reason that it is not to become operative until the sum of \$1,000,000 has been appropriated by Act of Assembly to be distributed among the several townships of the State for the improvement of public highways.

The new road will be given a grade of five degrees, or lower if possible. The old road averages twelve degrees. The proposed route which the viewers will likely report will run along the mountain side, below the present road and cross the Manassas road about half a mile west of where the present Brandonville road crosses it, and to the east of the Shenandoah Water Company's dam and connect with the present road somewhere near the dirt plane and the Kelly Run colliery. It is claimed the new road will increase travel to and from Brandonville.

HEATON SUCCESSFUL. A Week's Surveillance of a House Results in Arrests.

For a week past Policeman Michael Heaton had a house on East Centre street under surveillance and several times he warned the occupants that the neighbors were complaining about the place and, unless the practices complained of were discontinued, somebody would get into trouble. His warnings went unheeded and last night there was a quarrel in the place, the chief combatants being a woman known as "Jersey Lily" and one John Buddell.

Policeman Heaton got the "Lily" in tow and she made disclosures which resulted in the woman's arrest. Before Justice Toomey, charging Buddell with inciting to adultery, Heaton arrested Buddell, who was committed in default of bail. Buddell then swore out a warrant before the same Justice charging the "Lily" with keeping a common bawdy house and she gave bail for trial at court.

In swearing out her warrant the "Jersey Lily" gave her name as Carrie Hartwell. Buddell declares that he is her father, notwithstanding the name she gives.

RELIEF CORPS CONVENTION. The Delegates Will Convene in Town Next Thursday.

The sixth annual convention of the Women's Relief Corps of the Seventh District of Pennsylvania will convene in town next Thursday. About one hundred delegates will be in attendance, from Lancaster, Hazleton, Lykens, Pottsville, Mahanoy City and other places.

The funeral of James Cunningham, aged 36 years, who died at his home in Frackville on Saturday, took place this morning, high mass being celebrated in St. Joseph's church.

Martha Gaughan, aged 74 years, one of the best known residents of Lower Lerneuse county, and for many years prominent in Democratic politics, died yesterday.

Supervisor Again Arrested. Last Wednesday Supervisor Brennan and William Umbelawicz, an East Centre street croaker, got into an altercation because the latter refused to move his team and make room for the scattering of dirt on the street.

Whitehouse, Esq. Brennan was before Justice Shoemaker with Borough Solicitor Burke and again waived a hearing and entered bail. Constable Bertram stated that he was not aware that the first suit was pending.
