BANKRUPTCY ACT PARAMOUNT. Important Decision in the Illinois

United States District Court. Springfield, Ills., Oct 6.—In the Uni-Judge Allen rendered an important decision involving the entire construc-tion of the bankruptcy act. The case was that of Mrs. Nancy E. Gast, owner of a valuable farm near Girard, Macoupin county, was filed a petition in bankruptcy, giving assets at \$24,000 and liabilities at \$21,000. Seven holders of mortgages on various parts of the property sought to foreclose in-dependent of the bankruptcy act. Henry C. Hamilton, trustee of the Henry C. Hamilton, trustee of the bankrupt, filed a petition for the sale of the property in the bankrupt court and asked for a temporary injunction against the prosecution of the fors-closure suits. Judge Allen held that the bankrupt court had full power over all mortgages and dower interests, and that they must go into the bankrupt court.
