The Brennan Petitions.

The Supreme Court, at Philadelphia, handed down a number of decisions yesterday, two of them bearing on cases from Schuylkill county. In the case of Commonwealth vs. Thomas Brennan, convicted of the murder of Henry Elliott at Philadelphia, the court refused the petition to fix a date for argument of the appeal before the court and granted the petition of Brennan's counsel for leave to argue the appeal on the stenographer's notes. Brennan not having funds with which to have his case on appeal printed. The other decision was on the case of Rose et al. trustees of the Salem church of Tamaqua vs. Christ. The court affirmed the judgment of the Schuylkill county court.
