HONOR MANILA HEROES.

COL. BARNETT, OF THE "FIGHTING TENTH," WILL SPEAK HERE TOMORROW EVENING.

FOUGHT WITH DEWEY

ACCOMPANIED BY SEVERAL OFFICERS AND PRIVATES OF HIS REGIMENT.

MEETING IN FERGUSON'S THEATRE.

The Tenth Regiment Glee Club, composed of soldiers who fought in Luzon, are among the distinguished party that will be the guests of the patriotic people of Shenandoah.

GIVE THEM A ROYAL WELCOME.

Shenandoah, always ready to honor the nation's heroes, will be in a blaze of glory tomorrow evening.

Lieutenant-Colonel James E. Barnett, candidate for State Treasurer, accompanied by a number of other officers and men of the Fighting Tenth Pennsylvania Regiment, and also the Tenth Regiment Glee Club, composed of soldiers who fought in Luzon, will visit Shenandoah tomorrow evening and will address the patriotic citizens of the town in Ferguson's theatre.

Included in the party will be Col. Barnett and the following officers and privates of the Tenth Regiment: Major and Surgeon George W. Neff, of Masontown.

Lieutenant Blaine Aiken, of Washington. Quartermaster E. B. McCormick, of Greensburg. Adjutant Oliver S. Scott, of Monongahela City.

Corporal William T. Don, of Greensburg. Private Alexander B. Young, of Prosperity. Private Charles B. Playford, of Uniontown.

Bugler Herbert N. Smith, of Mount Pleasant. And a glee club under the leadership of Corporal Wilbur Harris, of New Brighton.

A distinguished addition to the party is Major J. N. Killian, of the 1st Nebraska, which was in the same brigade as the Tenth at Manila, under command of General Hale. Major Killian and Colonel Barnett are close friends, an intimacy born of war time comradeship, fighting shoulder to shoulder.

It goes without saying that Shenandoah will give the men who fought under the Stars and Stripes in the Philippines a royal welcome, and it is safe to predict that Ferguson's Theatre, tomorrow evening, will be taxed to its utmost capacity. The heart of every Pennsylvania throbs with delight when reviewing the heroes that have been showered upon the officers and men of this gallant Tenth volunteer regiment.

The arrangements for Col. Barnett's reception here are about completed, and a reception committee comprising about one hundred of the leading citizens of the town will meet the party at the depot tomorrow evening and headed by a band of music, will march through the principal streets to the theatre. The streets will be ablaze with fire works, and their ovation will be a demonstration of popular enthusiasm. It will not be confined to one particular class, but the people of the town as a whole will join in the welcome and bestow upon a gallant soldier a testimonial of their regard and affection which cannot but be taken as a compliment to every man who served in the Philippines with the peerless Dewey, and especially as a mark of respect and love for all the brave sons of the Keystone State who participated in the memorable campaign in the Luzon.

Col. Barnett and party will speak at Lebanon this evening, and will arrive at Pottsville tomorrow morning, and will be met there by Chairman Quail and a reception committee. They will arrive at Pottsville at 11.00 a. m. on Tuesday, and will address a noon meeting of the shops employees at that place, and during the afternoon will hold a reception at Pennsylvania Hall hotel and at the rooms of the Central Republican Club, and subsequently visit one or more of the suburbs.

The party will leave at 4.30 p. m., over the P. & R. railroad, for Shenandoah, and en route will make a short stop at Mahanoy Plane, and will arrive at Shenandoah at 6 p. m., where the party will be met at the depot by the reception committee, which has arranged for a hearty welcome.

Wednesday will be spent in the Mahanoy valley. Ashland, Gilberton, Mahanoy Plane, Girardville and Mahanoy City will be visited, the last stopping point in this county being Tamaqua, remaining there about a half hour before the departure for March Clark, where Colonel Barnett will speak in the evening.

INTERNATIONAL CONGRESS

To Open at Philadelphia's Export Exposition on Thursday Next. Philadelphia, Oct. 9.—The international commercial congress, composed of delegates from most of the civilized governments of the world and representatives from the most important chambers of commerce of all trade centers, will convene in the Auditorium of the National Export exposition here on Thursday next.

Assistant Secretary of State David J. Hill will preside at the opening ceremonies and deliver an address of welcome to the foreign delegates. The full diplomatic corps at Washington will be present to give eclat to the occasion, and several members of the cabinet will accompany Assistant Secretary Hill and take part in the day's exercises. The address of the assistant secretary will be followed by a speech by Mayor Ashbridge, of this city, who will welcome the members of the congress to the city and extend to them the courtesies of the municipality.

In the morning prior to the assembling of the congress a reception will be held at the city hall to the delegates and dignitaries gathered to participate in the opening ceremonies. At the Auditorium, upon the conclusion of Mayor Ashbridge's address, Mr. Charles H. Cramp, president of the Philadelphia Commercial Museum, will formally open the proceedings in an address explaining the purposes and scope of the congress. His address will be followed by a speech by Director W. P. Wilson. President McKinley will participate in the opening of the congress by sending a message immediately upon the conclusion of the other proceedings of the day.

Among the delegates at the opening of the congress will be a large number of representatives from Spain, and one of the most interesting figures among the delegates will be the president of the chamber of commerce of Manila.

Narrowly Escaped Death. William Kay, 26 years, Frank Schoffstall, 25 years, are in a critical condition at the Mine's hospital, Pottsville Springs, owing to an accident at the Greenwood colliery, near Tamaqua, yesterday morning, by which they narrowly escaped death. They went into the mines to complete some work they were unable to finish on Saturday and were caught

under a fall of rock and coal. Schoffstall sustained a compound dislocation of the right ankle and his body was badly contused and lacerated. Kay's right leg was fractured above the knee, his head was lacerated and his spine injured. It is feared he was internally injured, and he may die. Conrad Barlet, who worked with the men, jumped away from the fall in time and was only slightly injured.

BURNED TO DEATH.

The Terrible Fate of an Aged Man Near Mahanoy City.

Jacob Shimer, of Bowman's patch, near Mahanoy City, was burned to death at his home at 10.30 o'clock Saturday night. His body was so badly charred that it was unrecognizable. Shimer lived alone and was last seen at nine o'clock Saturday night, when he entered his house, smoking a pipe. About an hour later his home was discovered on fire. The residents of the patch hastened to the scene, but were unable to extinguish the fire on account of the inflammable nature of the small building. An investigation disclosed the charred body in that part of the house which Shimer used as a bedroom. The victim was sixty years old.
