OUR COUNTRY: First, Last and Forever.

ON the question of the settlement, immediate and ultimate, of the Filipino issue Jacob C. Schurman, the head of the Philippine commission, stands with the administration and the great body of the expansionists of all parties.

BEFORE the war Edward Atkinson devoted his time to pushing the merits of a cook stove made of an empty candle box and a 10c kerosene lamp. With each stove went a hand bill explaining how a person can live on 10c a day. Atkinson's idea of national destiny is put up on the same scale.

"THE hum of industry has drowned the voice of calamity, and the voice of despair is no longer heard in the United States, and the orators without occupation are now looking to the Philippines for comfort. As we opposed them when they were standing against industrial progress at home, we oppose them now as they are standing against the national duty, in our island possessions in the Pacific," President McKinley's speech at Kewanee, Ill., on Saturday.

PEOPLE who are inclined to criticise the conduct of the American campaign in the Philippines, would do well to contrast it with those of Spain in those islands. Gen. Rivera, in the first year of his campaign against the Filipinos, lost 8,000 prisoners, 1,000 killed or mortally wounded, and 2,000 disabled by disease, making a total of 11,000, or 46 per cent. of his entire command. Gen. Otis, in the eight months of his campaign, has lost 253 men killed, 92 deaths from wounds, 470 incapacitated from disease, and to prisoners, making the total 815, or about 21 per cent. of his entire command.

It may not be generally known, but it is nevertheless true that the business management of the present board of County Commissioners in the last year has saved the county \$4,000 per month, or \$50,000 in a year. The county is in no need of funds, something unusual in this branch of the county administration. If the present business management is continued a few years our county will have no debt, and the burdens our people have carried for years will disappear. This is one great reason why the present management should be continued. The election of Kantner and Reber, the one now president of the board, the other a clerk who understands the present policy, will so conduct the affairs of the county that the hard earned

Turkish Official Assassinated.

THREE NEW YORK MURDERS.
One Tells the Story of a Disappointed Lover's Vow.
New York, Oct. 9.—Three murders occurred among the Italians in greater New York yesterday. Joseph Marini, an Italian plasterer, 28 years of age, was found murdered in his home in a tenement in Little Italy. He was lying undressed in bed, with a bullet in his heart. The police believe that either the man's father committed the deed or else was driven temporarily insane because of the crime.

The old man attracted attention by his peculiar actions. He was accompanied by his little daughter, and he seemed in mortal dread of something. His face was blanched, his knees trembled, and he seemed speechless. So strange were his actions that he was surrounded by a great crowd of people, but he started to run away. He made good his escape from the crowd, but an investigation was made by the police and the body of the man's son was found, with the little girl weeping beside it.
Michel Angelo, an Italian speculator, was shot and killed in Brooklyn by Michael Cangoes, a fellow countryman. The shooting followed a quarrel over the murder of the woman owned by the victim. The murder was committed in the presence of many passers by.
Anton Schavelli was shot and killed in Astoria by another Italian, who gave his name as Carmelo Giancetas. The murderer was arrested. Schavelli, who had lived in Astoria for several years, was walking in company with his wife, when a man walked close to him and scrutinized him carefully. He then drew a revolver and fired four bullets at Schavelli, all of which took effect. Italians say the shooting of Schavelli was a long standing feud that the murderer promised to pay. Fourteen years ago they say, Giancetas fell in love with the photograph of a girl while in this country, and said he would marry her. A younger brother of Anton Schavelli, however, married her, and Giancetas vowed vengeance. He said he would kill his rival and his rival's three brothers. He shot two of the brothers at different times in New York City, and each time made his escape. Both men recovered.

THE SPEEDY SHAMROCK.

She Developed Splendid Qualities in Saturday's Third Fluke.

CONFIDENCE IN THE COLUMBIA.

But the Betting is Favor of the American Boat is Influenced Rather by Local Pride Than by the Judgment of Yachting Experts.

New York, Oct. 9.—The third attempt of the Columbia and Shamrock to sail over a full course in an American cup contest was abandoned Saturday when the yachts were five miles from the finish. It was a very even race, with the honors slightly in favor of the Shamrock, the challenger starting 17 seconds after Columbia, overhauled the American cup defender and was first around the mark. She also showed herself to be superior in windward work while the breeze lasted. Shamrock took another rise. There is a feeling about town that the historic cup is in greater danger than ever before.

The more Saturday's performance is considered and discussed the less encouraging it seems to the American yachtsmen. The Shamrock is a wonder in light weather. That is settled beyond doubt by the three days of drifting. She has surprised her own people and has given the other people a great shock. She handles splendidly, and there are men on board who know how to do the handling.

The feeling of the American yachtsmen that the challenger was entering the races unprepared and untried has disappeared. They have seen her fit for the struggle, and they know that she is ready to do her best.

In response to an inquiry made last evening as to what was being done by way of preparation, her managers said: "Nothing. There she is, ready for the gun."

Each side is still confident, but it must be admitted that the backers of the green boat are showing the most hope. They say they know what she can do in heavy weather. It only required those days of drift to convince them that she was just as good in light air. The whole Shamrock contingent is a happy one, and there is no one to begrudge them their pleasant moments.

The Columbia people are not unhappy, by any means. On the contrary, they still confidently assert that, of course, the cup stays. But they have been shocked, and they have been shocked in a most decisive manner. They know there will be no walkover. They know more than this, but they are not telling what it is.

The betting is still slightly in the Columbia's favor, but this is not based on the judgment of yachting experts. There is more Columbia money to be had, because of local pride, and this is the influencing fact in the matter.

The opinion was quite general yesterday that there was something in Saturday's racing by which a line could be drawn on the merits of the boats. There was wind enough for a couple of hours to furnish a test, the first real test of the week, and while it lasted and the boats were under equal conditions the Shamrock did better work.

That is the reason for the rise in the Shamrock stock today. She is good in a run down before the wind. She is good in a beat to windward. What she will do in a reach is undecided, but the impressions are against her on this point of sailing.

Admiral Dewey will not be able to see tomorrow's race from the Erin. He has so many engagements that it finds it impossible to be present, and so telegraphed Sir Thomas Lipton yesterday.

By a mutual agreement between the representatives of the New York Yacht club and the Royal Ulster Yacht club the Columbia and Shamrock will sail every day in the next week, and the question of international yachting supremacy is established. The request for such an arrangement came from Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of the challenger. Sir Thomas wanted the races to be sailed daily after tomorrow, but the members of the New York Yacht club refused to assent to such an arrangement.
