Death of the Oldest Rallroad Engineer Red Bank, N. J., Oct. 18 .-- Joseph Wood, the oldest locomotive engineer in the United States, died at his home here yesterday, aged 82. He was fire-man on the "John Bull," the first locomotive ever operated in this country. The engine was sent from Eng-land in 1830, and given its first trial near Bordentown, Mr. Wood's native town. Mr. Wood was employed as an engineer during the war, and was also engaged in the same capacity on a number of railroads in this section. He was the inventor of Wood's improved frog, a steam whistle and steam pipe, and other railroad appliances






