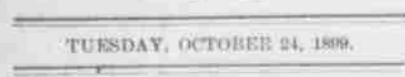

OUR COUNTRY: First, Last and Forever.

THEY do say that Chairman Noonan's press censorship has holes in it. It leaks.

THE outlook for Republican success in this county was never brighter. This, surely, is a Republican year.

SPEAKING of families, there is one that the Democrats studiously avoid mentioning. That is the car family.

OUR Democratic friends are becoming desperate; that is, the candidates of that party. They charge that there is a traitor in the organization.

ON Saturday former Congressman Brum leaves for Ohio, where he will stump that state in the interest of the Republican ticket. He will remain there until the eve of election.

WE have no objections to the Evening Chronicle quoting from the HERALD columns, which it frequently does. But we do object to being held responsible for the opinions of others.

ONE of the most popular candidates on the Republican ticket is John T. Schoener, candidate for Clerk of the Courts. And his popularity is not confined to the Republican ranks, either.

It is generally acknowledged that W. S. Leib, the present chief deputy, will succeed Prothonotary Deegan. Even the Democratic mathematicians concede his election by a handsome majority.

THE Ashland News, a Democratic paper, advocates the election of the Republican candidates for County Commissioner, because their record deserves endorsement at the hands of the people.

THE Democratic newspapers concede that Emanuel Jenkin has made a popular and efficient Recorder, and deserves re-election. He is a true representative of the miners, and they will give him hearty support.

THE question has been asked quite frequently, especially by the Democratic candidates and their friends, as to the whereabouts of the Hon. James Ryan. Information leading to his discovery will be thankfully received at Democratic headquarters.

GUS DORFLEINER, the old soldier and Republican candidate for Treasurer, will leave Pottsville with 1900 majority. Dewey's barrel can't injure a man who stood when bullets flew like hail stones, and swords gleamed about his throat like fiery serpents in the air.

COL. BRYAN is now beginning to complain that he was counted out in 1896. Curiously enough, he began his lamentations in Kentucky, where he had gone to talk for the election of the maker of a notoriously unfair election law. On the whole, the Colonel is not adding to his reputation by his present performances.

WHILE the campaign in Pennsylvania drags along seemingly with no one except the candidates taking any special interest in the result, the contests in Ohio, Kentucky, Nebraska and Maryland are of the red-hot and hustling order. These are being closely watched by the men who keep the run of national politics, for the reason that the outcome will bear strongly on what may be expected in the great campaign that will take place next year. McKinley cannot afford to lose Ohio, and should Kentucky and Nebraska be carried against the Democrats, Bryan would be forced into the position of leading a forlorn hope. A sweeping Democratic victory in all the four states named might result in the retirement of McKinley in favor of some current hero like Dewey, Schley or Roosevelt. Such a coming to pass is not probable and barely possible, but things more astonishing have occurred in politics, the nomination of Bryan four years ago, for instance, and the failure of the Blaine move-

ment in 1876. Politics at times has a way of taking queer twistings and turnings.

THE PAIGES RICH AGAIN.

EX-Congressman Wins His Claim For New York Aqueduct Contract. Akron, Oct. 24.—As the result of a decision made in the New York court of appeals David H. Paige, formerly congressman from this district, and now living in New York, and his brother, City Commissioner Albert T. Paige of this city, will become rich again.

About ten years ago the Paiges and General D. M. Carey, of Cleveland, composing the firm of Paige, Carey & Co., had contracts for six miles of the Croton aqueduct in New York city. When the work was concluded claims for \$7,000,000 for extras were thrown out and payment was refused. Of this amount Paige, Carey & Co. held nearly \$2,000,000. On top of this came the explosion regarding over \$700,000 worth of paper given by D. R. Paige, and bearing the endorsement of Millionaire John Huntington, of Cleveland. Huntington was on his deathbed in Europe, and before he could testify whether or not the notes were genuine, after his death his executors refused to honor the notes, claiming that the endorsements were forgeries.

Paige fled to South America. In 1896 he returned and compromised the Huntington notes. He then devoted all his energies to securing a decision in the courts in regard to the aqueduct work which he has now secured.

Forest Fires Endanger Connellsville.

Connellsville, Pa., Oct. 24.—Connellsville is blinded with the terrific forest fires which are raging without any interruption all along the crest and sides of Cheat and Ridge. The situation is really serious, an extensive and wide area in the area of flames. The air is so laden with the blinding blue smoke that the citizens of Connellsville cannot see across the Youghiogheny river into New Haven, and every house is filled with the haze. Robbed of a Fortune in Jewels.

Miami Should Be Depopulated. Miami, Fla., Oct. 23.—Dr. Jose Y Porter, state health officer, who is temporarily staying in this city, has issued the following: "After a careful examination of many of the cases of yellow fever the state health officer announces the existence of yellow fever in this city. Five distinct cases of yellow fever have been seen, and from clinical histories submitted there are doubtless several others. The infection is distributed over the town, mild in character, but unmistakable in recognition. To limit the spread of and to destroy the infection rapidly as possible, depopulation of Miami is recommended."

Five Years For Contumacious Bismarck. Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 24.—Harry F. St. Clair was yesterday sentenced to five years in Auburn prison for bigamy. St. Clair took his sentence calmly, and corrected the assistant district attorney as to the number of his wives, claiming he had married three instead of five women. He also admitted that his real name is Frank O'Brien, and his residence Hamilton, Ont. He gave his age as 21 years, but he looks much younger.

Expelled From the House of Commons. London, Oct. 24.—During the course of the day's proceedings in the house of commons the honorable Patrick O'Brien, Parliamt member for Kilkenny City, declared that the hands of the British secretary of state for the colonies, Joseph Chamberlain, were as much stained with blood as those of any murderer who ever mounted the scaffold. The speaker called on Mr. O'Brien to withdraw his remarks, but he refused to do so, whereupon the house, by a vote of 315 to 29, resolved to suspend him, and he left the house remarking: "You had better bring up another army corps, unless you want it somewhere else."

Threatened Rolling Mill Strike. Springfield, Ill., Oct. 24.—A strike is imminent at the rolling mills owned by the Republic Iron and Steel company, which will involve 800 men. The workers demand an increase from 12 1/2 to 15 cents per hour. Judging from present indications the company will not grant the scale, in which event the men will strike. Such a move will close the plant, as it is said the other workmen will strike in sympathy. The members of the Amalgamated Association of Iron and Steel Workers, composed of the high class workmen, were recently granted the scale demanded.

Removed Town to Operate Mine. Duluth, Minn., Oct. 23.—The Spruce Mining company has filed articles, with a capital of \$1,000,000, to open and operate the Eveleth Townsite mine, which was discovered under the village of Eveleth, and from over the top of which the removal of the village is a very recent completed. The mine is a very rich one, and of good size. It will be shipped next year, and has a maximum agreed output of 15,000 tons, with as much as the operators can put out in addition.

Ex-Senator Mitchell the Candidate. Philadelphia, Oct. 23.—As stated in these dispatches on Saturday, ex-United States Senator John I. Mitchell, of Iowa county, was nominated by the Republican state committee to fill the vacancy on the ticket made by the retirement of Josiah R. Adams from the contest of the superior court judgeship. There was no other candidate before the committee, all others having dropped out of the race at an early date. It is known that Governor Stone has become the nomination of Judge Mitchell and that other political leaders had acquiesced in the governor's selection.
