A CUBAN PROTEST
 Against Gen. Rivera's Prohibition of the "Art" of Cook Fighting. CHARGES AGAINST OUR SOLDIERS

Cuban Judge said They were Killing Respectable Cubans—An Investigation Proved the Charge Groundless, and the Judge May Lose His Place.

Havana, Oct. 26.—Cuban opinion is against the proclamation of the civil governor of Havana, General Rius Rivera, prohibiting cook fighting. The proclamation is also considered as to the nature of a protest against the failure of Governor General Brooke to prohibit cook fighting at the time when he prohibited bull fighting. A man to whom General Rivera has refused a permit for a cock fight has written to La Jirafa to say that cock fighting is particularly popular among the Cubans, and that if General Rivera will not allow it he intends to appeal to the governor general.

The accusations recently brought by Senor Juan Calderon, one of the Judges at Gibara, who asserted that American soldiers had been killing respectable Cubans, were thoroughly investigated by General Leonard Wood, military governor of the province of Santiago, and General Castillo, the civil governor, as well as by the Audiencia. The evidence was placed in the hands of General Brooke, who requested the Judge advocate general, Lieutenant Colonel Dudley, to prepare a legal opinion. The latter reported that after examining all the evidence he could find no ground for the accusation, and it is thought that the dismissal of Judge Calderon would be justifiable.

BRITISH CASUALTIES
 Since the Beginning of Hostilities in the Transvaal COUNT UP NEARLY SIX HUNDRED.

Of These Eighteen Officers and Fifty-five Men Have Been Killed, According to Official British Reports—Boer General Kock Will Recover.

London, Oct. 26.—The war office returns show that the total British casualties since the beginning of hostilities in the Transvaal reach 597, 18 officers having been killed and 52 wounded, and 76 men killed and 432 wounded. There are 13 unaccounted for. This total, however, does not include the squadron of the Eighteenth Hussars, which went astray near Dundee, and the officers of the Dublin Fusiliers. The report of heavy losses sent from Klerfontein came as an unpleasant surprise, as General White's telegram to the war office on Tuesday gave the impression that there was merely a brush.

A dispatch to The Daily Telegraph from Ladysmith, dated Monday, says: Thirty of the Eighteenth Hussars, who were sent from Glencoe to intercept the retreat of the Boers from Eladlanglang, were cut off by the enemy. Under Sergeant Balfour they bravely fought their way across the Biggarsberg, the enemy pursuing and firing at them at a range of 200 yards along the passes. They arrived here at 10 o'clock this morning. Three of the troop are missing, owing to the break down of their horses. The Boers used a Maxim. A lieutenant of the Hussars, with a party, was driven back to Glencoe.

The Daily Mail has the following from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, dated Oct. 23: The proclamation of martial law throughout Natal has given great satisfaction. Among the Boer prisoners at Ladysmith are Wewitz Hamar, member of the rand for Barberton, and Dr. Van Leggele, public prosecutor at Heidelberg. Among the killed was Mr. De Jong, secretary of the Transvaal educational department. It is now expected that General Jan Kock, the Boer commander, who was reported dead from his wound, will recover. General White gave him the option of being taken to Pretoria or remaining at Ladysmith, and he chose the latter.

A delayed dispatch from Ladysmith says: The Boer wounded and prisoners are still coming in, and the former are receiving every attention. General Ben Viljoen is wounded and a prisoner. Since it is practically certain that General Yule has now effected a junction with General White, and as both are now in a position of safety, conjecture concerns itself chiefly with the manner of General Yule's retreat from Dundee. That it was hasty is evident.

Was it disorderly? Was any considerable camp equipment abandoned? Was there any fighting on the way? Such questions, and others like them, the public is anxiously asking. Since the receipt of General White's curious first description of the Ladysmith fight, in which the British lost a hundred men, little reliance can be placed on the official dispatches. While the concealment of the facts regarding General Yule's retreat can be amply justified on the ground of keeping the intelligence from the Boers, the hiding of the news respecting the Hussars and Fusiliers, who were apparently captured in the battle at Glencoe, is severely criticized, no intimation even having been given that the officers were missing.

The British cruisers Purvis, Pelorus and Pactolus sailed from Queenstown yesterday afternoon en route to Cape Clear, where they will meet eight battleships and two cruisers of the channel squadron, from the north of Ireland. The fleet will then proceed ostensibly to Gibraltar, but it is thought that possibly the fleet's destination is a Spanish or Portuguese port, as the vessels have taken out bills of health from the consuls of these countries.

Dispatches from the continent to The Daily Mail say that the French fleet has received instructions to watch the movements of the British Mediterranean squadron, and that the Italian fleet is under orders to concentrate in the Bay of Spezia.

Although news has arrived that General Sir William Penn Symons is doing well, there is no indication as to his whereabouts. It is presumed that he is at Dundee, in the hands of the Boers.

Minister Andrade's Peculiar Position
 Washington, Oct. 26.—The Venezuelan legislation here is in anomalous condition since the success of the Venezuelan revolution. Minister Andrade is a brother of President Andrade, who fled before the revolutionary general, Castro, who has now assumed control of the government. It is assumed that the minister will retire, but there has been no outward change thus far. The minister has been in Paris for some time, and is expected back shortly.

AN ALLEGED SWINDLING GAME
 Which Has Led to the seizure of Several Iron Dealers' Property. Buffalo, Oct. 26.—The property of Janowitz & Co., scrap iron dealers, of this city, has been seized by the sheriff as the result of investigation made by a number of detectives from Pittsburgh. It is alleged that the firm has defrauded the following concerns out of the sums stated: Dubois Iron works, Dubois, Pa., \$5,337; Clark Brothers, Belmont, N. Y., \$3,560; Ridgeway Dynamo and Engine company, Ridgeway, Pa., \$2,741; Niagara Hauler company, Tonawanda, N. Y., \$3,743; Oil Well Supply company, Bradford, Pa., \$1,317.

James E. Dubois, owner of the Dubois Iron works, made affidavit that the junk dealers, in 35 carloads of iron, charged him for about 1,000 tons which were never delivered, and collected \$6.50 a ton therefor. Affidavits of a similar nature were made by representatives of the other firms mentioned. It was stated in the investigation before the court that the junk firm had a fraudulent arrangement with Joseph G. Kelley, weighmaster and yardmaster for the Erie railroad at Hick Hook.

THE KENTUCKY FEUDISTS.
 Necessity For Calling Troops to Prevent a Fight in Court.

London, Ky., Oct. 26.—Three companies of militia have been requested from Governor Bradley pending the trial of the Griffiths and Chadwell for the recent killing of the Philpotts. Judge Everette has made a statement about witnesses being afraid to appear, and it is thought that troops will be secured, the same as for the Baker trial. Even with the troops present it is probable that there will be a motion for a change of venue.

The grand jury impaneled at Manchester at the term of court which began Monday has a big task before it. There are 12 murders, besides the assassination of Tom Baker, to be investigated. Yesterday the jury returned true bills against Sol. Jim and Tom Griffin, charging them with the murder of Deputy Sheriff Wash Tucker, and Eddy and Floyd Chadwell, charging them with complicity in the crime. Eddy Chadwell was indicted for the plot and was made and executed by the Griffiths to revenge the advantage Thatcher had given the Philpotts by his testimony against the Griffiths after the battle of July 17, in which four Griffiths and one Philpott were killed. The town is full of witnesses and feudists.
