

A sad feature of the engagement was that three Englishmen who were impressed at Krugersdorp fought with the enemy, one of them being killed. Two others, greatly affected, said they

were compelled to fight. A dispatch from Pretoria yesterday ays: "The bombardment of Mafeking by General Cronje's commande began Tuesday morning and was continued yesterday. The women and children were given ample time to leave the town. Several houses are in flames." As no verification of the report has been received little credence is placed in it.



Resented His Namesake's Marriage in Dividing His Fortune.

ALFRED THE PRINCIPAL HEIR.

Cornellus, Who Married Miss Wilson Against His Pather's Wish, Is Left a Million and a Hair, to Which Alfred Will Add Six Millions.

of the will of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt were made public last night in a statement by Chauncey M. Depew. Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt inherits

tune, and becomes practically the head of the Vanderbilt family. The will makes no mention of the marriage of Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., to Miss Wilson, nor to any quarrel between father and son because of the union, but apparently the father's displeasure was visited upon the eldest son, he receiv-ing all told under the terms of the will but \$1,500,000, and \$1,000,000 of this is held in trust by the executors. Alfred Gwynne Vanderbilt is, of course, the residuary legates, and will possess a fortune of probably \$40,000, 000 to \$50,000,000. Gladys, Reginals and Gertrude (Mrs. Harry Payne Whit ney) will receive about \$7,500,000 each. But Mr. Depew states that Alfred will give from his share enough to Cor-nellus to make the latter as rich as his brother Reginald and his sisters. Alfred will, therefore, turn over to Cornellus about \$6,000,000.

The will provides a bequest to Mrs.

Vanderbilt, his widow, for her life, or the dwelling house and premises of Fifth avenue. Also the stable in East Thirty-eighth street, also all the house hold furniture, pictures, silver, musica instruments, works of art and all other articles in his residence in New York with the power to her to change or dis-pose of them during her lifetime, From this bequest is excepted, however, aucestral portraits and busts and por traits of himself and certain pieces o jewelry, which are distributed among his children, Alfred, Reginald, Ger-

trude and Gladys.
At the death of Mrs. Vanderbilt the property devised to her for life is given to either Alfred G. or Reginald C. as she may appoint by her will, and in default of such appointment it goes to the eldest of his sons then living, Alfred or Reginald, and if neither of them be living at the time of her death then to Gertrude, if living, and if no then to Gladys. In case neither of said sons or daughters shall survive his widow then this property is to be divided among the then living children of such sons and daughters, and if there be no grandchildren then it becomes part of the residuary estate.

Mrs. Vanderbilt gets his pew in Trinity church, Newport, R. I., and niso all his horses, vehicles, harness, equipments and stable furniture in his stables at the time of his death, except such as have been given during his lifetime to his children. His box at the Metropolitan Opera House is

also given to his widow.

The residence, land and property, with all furniture, etc., and contents of the houses and stables at Newport is given to Mrs. Vanderbilt for her natural life, and upon her death to such one of their children-Alfred Reginald, Gertrude and Gladys-as she


