STORM DAMAGE SOUTH.

Many Thousands of Dollars Lost in the Fury of the Gale.

ONLY ONE FATALITY REPORTED.

At Charleston a Small Frame Dwelling was Wrecked and One Child Killed—Many Cottages Wrecked on North Carolina's Coast.

Wilmington, N. C., Nov. 1.—Authoritative reports from Weightsville and Carolina Beach say that the storm, which reached the height of its fury at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, has wrought great havoc in property at those points. No loss of life is reported.

At Weightsville there are sixty odd cottages, and of this number fifteen are a total loss and the others badly damaged. Loss is estimated at from \$20,000 to \$25,000.

The treacherous of the Wilmington Sea Coast railroad and track, aggregating in extent about three miles, are wrecked and the damage is conservatively estimated at from \$10,000 to \$50,000.

At Weightsville Sound, on the main line, about one mile this side of the beach, considerable damage was also done, and this is estimated at several thousand. At Carolina Beach, near the mouth of the river, the loss is placed at from \$12,000 to \$15,000.

A Newbern dispatch says: A hurricane passed through this section Monday night. The tide was two feet higher than ever before. Small boats were thrown into the public streets. At midnight the firemen fought fire from lime barrels catching fire in the water. Many tons of salt and sugar in bags moistened and ran into the river. The river is full of floating cotton.

Schooner Wrecked on the Beach.

Norfolk, Nov. 1.—The storm in this section was severe Monday night. At Virginia Beach fishing nets, board-walks, fountains, etc., were washed away. The loss there is estimated at \$10,000. The three masted schooner Kate Darling was wrecked on Ocean View beach, having been driven high and dry.

Home Wrecked and Child Killed.

Charleston, Nov. 1.—A severe storm from the south passed up the coast Monday night. The wind reached a velocity of 58 miles. A small frame dwelling inhabited by a colored family was wrecked. One child was killed and three others injured.

CHARGES AGAINST GARDINER.

New York's District Attorney Attacked by the City Club.

New York, Nov. 1.—Governor Roosevelt was yesterday served with a copy of the charges preferred against Amos Bird Gardiner, district attorney of New York county, by the City club. There are 20 counts in the charges, which allege incompetency, wrongfulness, negligence and general inefficiency in discharge of duty.

District Attorney Gardiner declined to make any statement in regard to the charges. He said that he would first wait until a copy of the charges had been served upon him and then he would answer promptly and at the proper time. He said that his department was always open to investigation by any committee, and he courted the most strict investigation and scrutiny.

Richard Croker said that that was not along the lines that Republicans are going in this campaign. "There is nothing they won't do. The Republicans employ the legislature and everything for partisan purposes."

When the train arrived at the depot Conductor Reager discovered the messenger on the floor, with blood oozing from a ghastly wound. The express car was robbed of a considerable sum of money. The officers say that fully \$10,000 is missing.

WHITE OUTGENERATED.

British Commander Fell Into the Trap Set by Joubert.

A REPETITION OF MAJUBA HILL

Though on a Larger Scale—Two of Great Britain's Best Fighting Regiments Forced to Surrender to the Boers After Heavy Losses.

London, Nov. 1.—An official report received from General White yesterday has caused the greatest consternation. The report declares that in the battle of Lady Smith the Royal Irish Fusiliers, the Gloucestershire regiment and No. 10 mountain battery were cut off by the Boers in the hills, but bravely fought for several hours, and that the British were forced to fall back all along the battlefield line before the crushing attack. He adds: "I formed a plan, in the carrying out of which the disaster occurred, and I am alone responsible for the plan. There is no blame whatever to be placed on the position was untenable."

No dispatch, except the official telegram of General Sir George Stewart White, has thus far been permitted to mention the disaster, and no telegram from Lady Smith has been received in London since the advice from the British commander. This gives rise to a belief that communication has already been cut, in which event some time must elapse before details regarding British losses are received. If the war office officials have received information on this point they have refrained from publishing it. General White's estimate that the British losses were about 90 is evidently quite separate from the probable losses in killed and wounded among the captured battalions.

Sir George White's honest admission of full responsibility and the terms of his speech were regarded in some circles as a virtual placing his case in the hands of the home authorities, and it is even rumored that the war office has already decided to supersede him. The report, however, is discredited in well informed quarters.

In Gloucestershire and the north of Ireland, where the captured regiments were recruited, the blackest gloom prevails, families awaiting with beating hearts the names of the killed and wounded, which are fully expected to reach a high figure. Many homes are already in mourning in consequence of losses sustained by these regiments in previous engagements.

Public anxiety was increased by a special dispatch from Lady Smith, published in the late editions of the London afternoon papers, to the effect that before darkness Monday the Boers occupied the old position held by their heavy artillery, which General White had reported silenced by the guns of the naval brigade from the Powerful, and had opened fire again.

The dispatch further says: "The enemy are again closing in, and the situation is one of grave anxiety. Beyond doubt the Boer retirement on Monday was a ruse to draw General White into the hilly country and away from the British camp."

This last sentence is significant, and confirms the opinion of military experts here that General White is allowing himself to be outgenerated by Commandant General Joubert.

From the scanty advice received it seems tolerably certain that the disaster was a simple repetition of the battle of Majuba Hill, though on a larger scale. The two regiments were allowed to march into a trap set for them by the Boers. It is simply a case of the Boer spider and the gulle-ble British fly. In fact, the whole engagement of Monday seems to have been brought on by Commandant General Joubert, who skillfully conceived a gigantic trap, out of which, as the official dispatch shows, Sir George White only escaped with difficulty.

General White advanced with the idea of driving the Boers from the hill seven miles out, which General Joubert made an ostentatious show of fortifying on Sunday. The Boer commander left forward a force sufficient to draw General White on, while the mass of the Boers moved stealthily round the British right, to deliver a flank attack and to endeavor to cut off General White from Lady Smith. The British commander succeeded in beating off the attack, but only with great difficulty, and during the turning movement his troops suffered from a flank- ing fire.

About 6,000 fresh troops will arrive at Cape Town on Sunday next from England and will be available to reinforce Sir George White. Transports will arrive there daily after Sunday, and by the end of next week 25,000 troops will have been landed in South Africa. These men are intended for General Sir Redvers Buller's army, but they will undoubtedly be detached to Natal if the situation there should become perilous. The British army will eventually reach the huge total of 89,524, of which 68,524 will be regulars and the other 20,000 miscellaneous, but excellent colonial troops.
