No Extra Charges on Soldiers' Letters. Washington, Nov. 4.—The postmaster general has issued an order forbidding postmasters in the United States to collect postage due in excess of the domestic rate on any letters sent by soldiers, sailors, marines or other persons in the United States service in Guam and the Philippine islands. The order is given immediate effect.

Schley's Reception in Lynchburg. Lynchburg, Va., Nov. 4.—A reception committee of prominent citizens, including Mayor Smith and Senator Daniel, welcomed Admiral Schley here on his way south. England's Loyal Colonies. Sydney, N. S. W., Nov. 4.—Tremendous enthusiasm was displayed yesterday on the occasion of the embarkation of the second detachment furnished by the colony of New South Wales for service in South Africa. The colonial government is seriously considering doubling the contingent. The premier, Mr. Lyne, has communicated to the other Australian premiers a suggestion that the colonies should dispatch to South Africa another body of troops, to be called the Australian contingent. He says that if necessary 10,000 men could be sent.

CROKER AND MAZET.

Tammany Leader Denies Under Oath a Statement Made by Mazet. New York, Nov. 4.—Richard Croker appeared before the Mazet investigating committee yesterday, he said, for the purpose of denying the statement which he alleged Chairman Mazet had made in campaign statements in his assembly district in this city. The specific statement to which Mr. Croker noted exception was the assertion that in his dealings with the Consolidated Gas company he had tried to sell Amsterdam stock to that company. This assertion Mr. Croker denied under oath. Chairman Mazet at once notified the Tammany Hall leader that he was excused. This evidently surprised Mr. Croker, who apparently had expected a severe cross examination. Afterward Mr. Mazet issued for the press the following statement: "Mr. Croker knows that this is no place and no time in which to settle the question between him and me. What I said upon the stump I said out of my own knowledge, but upon good and sufficient knowledge. If Mr. Croker really wishes to have the truth of my statements tested he can sue me for libel or he can prosecute me criminally by a friendly district attorney. Here we cannot even compel Mr. Croker to answer proper questions, or compel any witness to testify on this matter, as the question between us is not relevant to this inquiry."

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OUR INTERESTS IN CHINA.

Our Government is Dissatisfied With Great Assurances. London, Nov. 4.—A special dispatch from Washington asserts that the American state department recently asked France, Germany and Russia to give written assurances regarding the preservation of the "open door" in China, being dissatisfied with mere oral assurances, and rejecting a proposal that the United States should seize a port and establish a sphere of influence in China. If these assurances are declined, says the dispatch, the United States will insist upon China observing the strict letter of the treaty giving the United States equal rights with other powers in China. The Daily Chronicle, commenting editorially upon "this new departure in American policy, which will be fully approved in England," dilates upon its "immense importance," and suggests that it "may affect the international politics of Europe in a very remarkable degree."

The Rush to Cape Nome. Dawson, Alaska, Nov. 4.—United States Consul McCook reports to Washington that the gold shipment for the season aggregated \$9,247,745. Prices of living have been slowly declining. Typhoid is decreasing and the death rate has also decreased. The rush to Cape Nome continues from mining camps all along the Yukon. At Circle City only 75 people remain out of 300. Eagle City has lost 500 of its population of 1,500, and Rampart City has only 200 of its former population of 1,600. The cape has now a population numbering thousands and supports many stores, dance houses and saloons.
