## PRIVILEGES TO SOLDIERS.

They Will Probably Be Permitted to Send Souvenirs Through the Mails. Washington, Nov. 4.—At yesterday's cabinet meeting the particular point under discussion was that involving the right under the law of our soldiers in the Philippines to send through the mails to friends in this country souvenirs of little or no commercial value. Under a strict construction of the law articles of any commercial value, except books, are prohibited from being sent through the mail. But the government, realizing that with the approach of the Christmas holidays the soldiers serving in the Philippines anxiously will wish to send home some mementos of their service, an honest effort will be made to overcome the difficulties presented. It is probable that Secretary Gage will formulate some regulation which will meet the situation.

## BALANCE GROWS \$60,000.

The County Commissioners Are Giving the People Good Administration.

The present board of County Commissioners are faithfully guarding the interests of the taxpayers of the county is now pretty generally conceded. If any further proof was needed, it is only necessary to direct attention to the healthy condition of the county treasury. This is hardly necessary, unless it be to those who are blinded by political or other considerations.

The statement for the month of October shows that the total expenditures for county purposes was \$28,536.96, but out of this amount \$20,000 was a judgment paid to the Safe Deposit Bank, so that the net expenditures for the month was \$8,536.96.

The balance in the treasury has increased over \$30,000 since the first of October. The amount of the 1899 duplicate paid in this far is about \$102,270.63.

It can thus be readily seen that \$44,000.00 is the amount of this year's duplicate which has been paid for county purposes. Deducting the \$20,000 judgment paid, only \$24,000 of this year's duplicate has been expended up to November 1st.

This is a condition of affairs deserving of the highest commendation, and is the result of the excellent business-like, economical administration inaugurated by Commissioner Kautner and his colleagues.

Traffic was blocked for five hours.

Pennsylvania Road Brines Suit. New York, Nov. 4.—The Pennsylvania Railroad company has filed papers in a libel suit to recover \$10,000 from the City of Augusta, of the Savannah River, for damages to the ferryboat Chicago, sunk in collision. The libel alleges that the City of Augusta was at fault in keeping too near the New York pier line, running at too high a rate of speed and failing to take the proper precautions to avoid a collision.
