GENERAL CRONJE'S PROTEST.

He Declares the British Are Violating the Geneva Convention. London, Nov. 15.—There is no additional news regarding the progress of hostilities in South Africa this morning except a dispatch from Mafeking, forwarded by a runner, dated Oct. 31, which says that during the afternoon General Cronje, the Boer commander, sent an envoy to Colonel Baden-Powell, in the name of a flag of truce, to declare that he did not consider the Geneva convention authorized the flag of the Red Cross society to fly from several buildings at once in the town, and that in his opinion the employment of natives against whites and the use of dynamite mines were both opposed to the rules of war.

Colonel Baden-Powell replied that the Geneva convention did not stipulate as to the number of Red Cross stations permissible, and that the Boers were only required to respect the convent, the hospital and the women and children all of which were beyond the town limits. The British commander also pointed out that mines were recognized adjuncts of civilized warfare, and that the defenses of Pretoria were extensively mined. Moreover, he reminded General Cronje that the Boers had been ordered to refrain from their kraals and raiding their cattle, and that the natives only defended their lives and property.

Despite three warnings from Colonel Baden-Powell the Boers continued defiantly to shell the hospital and the kraals and to raid the cattle, and the Boer envoy was regarded as a mere pretext for penetrating the British lines.

Fransworth's Rival in Bigamy. Chicago, Nov. 15.—James Monroe, the alleged bigamist and swindler, who was arrested here Sunday, left for Rochester yesterday in custody of police officers of that city, to be tried on charges of bigamy and bigamy. Mrs. Mary J. Colthart, of Dunkirk, Ill., who it is said Monroe married and afterward deserted in Rochester, N. Y., after obtaining \$4,100 from her, identified Monroe. Monroe's record as a bigamist, it is said, bids fair to eclipse that of the recently arrested Fransworth, who was recently arrested charged with having 42 wives in different parts of the world. The police already have the names of 26 women who have been married and victimized by Monroe.

Batavia Islands Belong to Japan. Madrid, Nov. 15.—In the Spanish senate yesterday Senator Montero Rios, replying to Count Almendra, who recently declared that owing to the ignorance of the Spanish-American treaty commissioners three islands of the Philippine group—the two Batavia and Calayan islands, both north of Luzon—were not included in the scope of the treaty, said the islands referred to were not ceded because they belonged to Japan, and were not claimed by the Americans.

Washington, Nov. 15.—Surgeon General Sutherland's annual report says the total number of deaths in our armies, including regulars and volunteers, from May 1, 1898, to June 30, 1899, was 6,519, of whom 498 were killed in battle, 216 killed by accident, 202 died of gunshot wounds and wounds received in action, 2,774 from typhoid fever, 475 from malaria fever, 359 from pneumonia, 342 from diarrhoea and dysentery and 185 from yellow fever.

Rochester's Conditional Gift. Rochester, N. Y., Nov. 15.—On the authority of Rev. Dr. A. H. Strong, president of the Rochester Baptist Theological seminary, it is announced that John D. Rockefeller, president of the Standard Oil company, has just made a conditional pledge of \$150,000 to the support of the seminary. Mr. Rockefeller will give \$1 for every dollar that may be raised in our armies, donations, till an aggregate of \$300,000 shall have been secured.
