## COUNCIL MEETING.

**Proceedings at a Brief Session Held Last Night.**

A regular meeting of the Borough Council was held last night and it was a brief one, an adjournment being within forty minutes after the meeting was called to order. The Council in attendance were Messrs. Coakley, Musazzio, Howells, Hand, Freeman, Murphy, Harlow, Bell, Francis, Tracey, Shoenberger and James. Mr. Bell was elected temporary chairman in the absence of President McGee.

Mr. Michael McDonald appeared and declared that he would not pay a water tax unless the borough had a water main. He stated that if the water committee could be formed the matter would be referred to the water committee with power to act.

The street committee made a lengthy report in writing in which it recommended the payment of \$4,000 on account of the street paving contract and asked that Council fix a time for a final inspection and acceptance of the paving. As to the claim of W. J. Brown, of West Oak street, for damages, the committee reported that, after an inspection, it reached the conclusion that the rain water from the roof of Mr. Brown's premises carried a heavy load of material on to the gutter on the property of the adjoining owner, and that if the sidewalk of the premises had a proper pitch to the gutter the trouble would be avoided. The committee also recommended that the Chief Burgess notify property owners at the northwest corner of the Main street and north Council street, of Main and Coal streets to put their gutters to grade and pave them.

In connection with the W. J. Brown claim a letter from T. H. Reddell, Esq., counsel for Mr. Brown, was read and the matter was referred to the street committee.

The fire apparatus committee was instructed to ascertain the cost of extending the fire alarm system to Turkey Run, on motion of Mr. Howells.

Joseph Houser sent in a claim for \$18.35 for loss of time and expense incurred for medical attendance on account of injuries sustained by falling into an ungravelled cellar way at the rear alley end of the Framey property on Lloyd street. The matter was referred to the street committee, with instructions to notify the property owner of the claim.

Borough Surveyor Gregory sent in the following communication in reference to a lot on the grade of the curb at the northwest corner of Main and Coal streets and find, as it is now placed, to be correct and in accordance with the figures as shown by Mr. Cochran in the grade book compiled by him in the year 1877.

The street committee was instructed to take this report with other data and request a meeting with the committee and surveyor, with the committee and surveyor, to have the matter adjusted and avoid, if possible, any unnecessary law suit, the committee to be guided by the Cochran grade.

Borough Engineer W. G. Gregory and Inspector Mark Bowman reported that Contractor W. J. Britt had done 4,077 1/2 square yards of paving at a total cost of \$8,066.87, and that the balance due for the work amounted to \$4,969.97. The Schuylkill Traction Company has 770 feet of track paved at a width of eight feet, making 684 1/4 square yards. Contractor Britt was granted an order for \$3,000 on account of the same.

The lamp and street committee stated that P. J. Cleary was the only bidder for the two police overcoats and that, owing to the death of Policeman Michael Heaton but one overcoat was required. The committee has power to act.

Complaint was made that unknown parties had stolen new incandescent globes from the hallway of the borough building and old ones substituted. There is a suspicion as to the guilty parties. Steps are to be taken to stop the pilfering.

Just after Council adjourned Solicitor Burke sent in a communication, which stated that the passage of an ordinance imposing fine upon electric railway conductors running cars not displaying a license, and one imposing a toll for crossing the bridge over the Lehigh Valley railroad would be illegal. The solicitor also has doubt as to the right of Council to increase the tax on the electric railway, but has drafted two ordinances, one providing that a license certificate be displayed on each car, and the other providing for the use of fenders on all cars running into the borough. Council will act on these matters at the next meeting.

## COURT AT POTTSVILLE

### THE COAL DALE MURDER CASE CLOSED THIS MORNING.

**SECOND DEGREE VERDICT GIVEN.**

**The Jury Recommended the Prisoner to Mercy and a Motion for a New Trial is Made—Many Other Cases Disposed of.**

Pottsville, Nov. 17.—The trial of George Marcano for the murder of Michael Sorek at Coal Dale, was continued yesterday afternoon and today. After a three and one-half day trial, the jury in the afternoon returned a verdict of second degree murder.

The Commonwealth then offered the knife in evidence and read its case.

Mr. Ulrich made the closing address for the defense and then called the defendant, George Marcano, to the stand. He said he was born in Austria-Bihrany and came to America in 1891. He worked at No. 12 colliery, near Coal Dale, until the day of the night, May 25th, 1898, in which Sorek received his death wound. That night there was a party at his home and Sorek and his wife attended. The former was half drunk. A fight started outside and Marcano heard his brother shout for help. They would not let him go out. He then went upstairs and got from his clothing a small knife. When he came down stairs the knife was taken from him by Paul Morris and several others who knocked him down and pinioned him. He showed marks on his head to prove what he said. At last he got outside, but could not see, for the blood in his face and in his eyes. He then went to a bear by house and got a clean shirt and went to the Squire to tell him he was not guilty.

When shown the knife alleged to have been used the witness said he never saw it before and declared it was an Italian knife. When he returned to the boarding house he was told not to go inside, or he'd be killed. He stayed all night at another place and, being sick, left by another boarding house. When he returned to his home he found a note pinned to his door stating that he had killed Marcano in self defense, and the latter could not speak the Hungarian language. He swore that he did not kill Michael Sorek and that he did not stab him.

Mr. Ulrich made the closing speech for the defense and District Attorney Lechtel spoke for the Commonwealth, ending at 5:30 o'clock and this morning Judge Marr charged the jury, which retired at 10:35 to consider one of four verdicts—murder in the first or second degree, manslaughter and acquittal.

The jury returned at two o'clock with a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree and a recommendation to mercy.

Mr. Ulrich made a motion for a new trial and December 4th was fixed for argument. The prisoner was remanded to jail.

## GEN. YOUNG'S PROGRESS!

His Cavalry Surprise the Filipinos by Their Rapid Pace.

### AGUINALDO IN THE LOW COUNTRY

Rebel Leader Making Desperate Efforts to Escape to Bayombong.—Mrs. Aguinaldo Left Her Wardrobe Behind—Major Loma's Body Buried.

Manila, Nov. 17.—Reports have been received here from General Young, dated Humnigam, Wednesday. Humnigam is about 25 miles east of San Fabian. General Young is supposed to have advanced considerably further toward San Fabian.

A press representative telegraphed an account of the rapid pace with which General Young covered the road with his cavalry. The Macabebe corps completely surprised and demoralized the insurgents around the low country. A messenger and reinforcements who were captured are now from San Jose to San Nicolas expected the arrival of the Americans until a day or two after they actually arrived.

Aguinaldo and his government are said to be making desperate efforts to escape to Bayombong. All the information here is that he is still in the low country.

Lieutenant Johnson, with Troop M, Third Cavalry, captured on Wednesday at San Nicolas 18 barrels containing the wardrobe of Aguinaldo's wife, some personal effects, the records of the secretary of war and much commissary and medical supplies. Senora Aguinaldo probably escaped over the divide, but the secretary of war is thought to be inside the lines.

Thomas W. Hayes, a civilian, and Calvin S. Davis, of the Sixteenth Infantry, who were held prisoners by the insurgents, have been released.

Colonel Wessels captured at Tayug several hundred thousand pounds of rice, 2,500 pounds of salt, 2,500 pounds of flour, 2,500 pounds of sugar, 1,300 new uniforms and hundreds of thousands of Mauser shells.

The names of Lieutenant Gilmore and seven of his men were found written on the walls of the convent at San Quintin. The guardians of all the towns surprised related feebly. General Wheaton has not yet appeared.

The remains of Major John A. Logan, killed in action at San Jacinto, Saturday, were buried in Park cemetery yesterday morning. Many persons followed the body to the grave. Chaplain Pierce officiated, and the Twentieth Infantry furnished the escort, which was commanded by Major Robbins. The pall bearers were the captains of the Twentieth Infantry.
