Kansas City, Nov. 26.—Leonard B. Imboden, formerly of Fort Worth, Tex., who two months ago was found guilty of conducting a "wildcat" bank in this city, has been sentenced to ten years' imprisonment in the state penitentiary at Jefferson City. Imboden's family was well known in Texas. He had in his time engaged in numerous big financial schemes in the southwest.

FORCED LOANS IN COLOMBIA.
Every Native Who Cannot Pay Is Obligated to Enlist.
Kingston, Jamaica, Nov. 26.—The British steamer Atrato, from Baranquilla Tuesday and Colon Friday, reports a widespread revolutionary movement in Colombia and a grave outlook. Her cargo she landed with difficulty, and she was unable to secure an outward cargo, owing to the suspension of inland transportation.

Foreigners are excluded, but commercial houses in Colon and Panama are subjected to a forced loan of \$100,000 at 12 per cent. Business is practically suspended, famine prices prevail, and foreign exchange is at 800.
Foreigners are regarded with suspicion, the government claiming that the strength and popularity of the family are due to foreign support. The passengers of the Atrato complain that they experienced difficulty and in some instances indignity when securing passports to leave the country.

Fatal Fight on a Fishing Smack.
Belfast, Nov. 20.—As the result of a fight on board a fishing smack in the harbor Saturday night Captain Elbridge Folsom, of Belfast, is dead by drowning, and Captain Dell Dalley, owner of the smack, is suffering from wounds and exposure. Captain Dalley, who gave himself up to the police, says that Folsom came aboard his boat drunk and made a vicious attack on him. In the struggle which followed both men were precipitated into the water. Dalley succeeded in breaking Folsom's hold on him and reaching his boat again, although nearly exhausted.

NO ANARCHY IN CUBA.

Italian Socialist Orator Prohibited From Speaking in Havana.
Havana, Nov. 20.—The intervention of the remains of Cretel, the revolutionary army, who is described as the "instigator of socialism in Cuba," took place yesterday. The body had been lying in state at the headquarters of the Havana Trades Union. When the coffin was taken into the street a brief speech was made, introducing Falco, the Italian socialist.

Falco was about to deliver an oration when an inspector of police intervened and said he had received instructions from the authorities to prevent any address by Falco. The crowd cheered the Italian and told him to go on, but the police charged and knocked down several persons, and the crowd rapidly dispersed. Several prominent Cubans made loud protests.

A procession was then formed and the remains were taken quietly to the cemetery, a large body of police accompanying the cortege. The authorities had received an intimation that anarchist speeches would be made to incite the crowd, and Falco was expected to be the chief orator. Civil Governor Nunez is resolved not to allow public meetings where it is known that Falco will make appeals to popular passion.

A VIEW OF THE METEORS.

At Birmingham the Strange Phenomenon Frightened the Negroes.
Birmingham, Ala., Nov. 20.—Strange phenomena, supposed to be part of the tri-centenary meteoric disturbance, was observed here last night between the hours of 7 and 9 o'clock. As many as ten meteors were seen, all of which were in the nebular form, resembling comets. They first appeared as patches of light, and at times would glow a fiery red and then fade away, repeating this a number of times before they finally disappeared. During the lurid period the central body could be easily seen, the light radiating through the entire mass. These bodies appeared to be moving, the agitation being easily distinguished with the naked eye. The entire zenith was overcast, although outside the area the sky was clear. Great crowds gathered at the street corners, and many were appalled at the strange sight. A number of negroes resorted to prayer.

Bidding Soldier Boys Good-bye.
New York, Nov. 20.—Wives, sweethearts and friends of the Forty-first United States volunteers bade them good-bye yesterday afternoon as the big transport Logan pulled out into the river from the government pier at Brooklyn. Although the transport did not begin her long voyage to Manila until this afternoon, the officers in charge had the transport towed to an anchorage just off Governor's Island yesterday. In the company of the regiment, and men of the Forty-first regiment, there were several women on board the transport when she sailed. They are wives of officers and will accompany their husbands to the Philippines.

Democratic Leaders in Washington.
Chicago, Nov. 20.—Senator J. K. Jones, chairman of the national Democratic committee, who arrived last night, said he did not know what the executive committee would do today, but it could not call a meeting of the full committee until the next day. The convention, William J. Bryan is not to attend the meeting. Mayor David S. Rose, of Milwaukee, and ex-Governor Peck head a delegation of Democrats from Wisconsin, who are here to boost Milwaukee for the national convention. Milwaukee offers an auditorium seating 15,000 people and a guaranty of \$50,000.

Rev. Dr. Storrs Resigns.
New York, Nov. 20.—Rev. Dr. Richard S. Storrs, pastor of the Church of the Pilgrims, Brooklyn, has resigned because of failing health. Dr. Storrs has been the sole pastor of the church since its incorporation, 55 years ago. In all that time he has carried on the work of the church unaided, and until a few years ago has enjoyed the best of health.

Chicago, Nov. 20.—Chicago engineers are designing the earthquake proof steel palace for the crown prince of Japan, which is to mark the advent of American steel construction in the mikado's land, and the imperial government has appropriated \$3,000,000 for its erection. Foundations are being laid with a view to raising the framework in February. Around the skeleton of beams and bars will be built a house of granite and marble expected to eclipse in beauty of design anything the Orient has ever known. The palace will adjoin the royal home of the mikado in Tokio.
