A BILL to provide for a territorial government for Hawaii will be introduced in Congress at the beginning of the session. It is time that something was done to provide a satisfactory civil regime for Hawaii.

AND now that the Navy department has honored Admiral Schley with the command of the South Atlantic squadrons it is to be hoped that his rabid newspaper partisans will cease their persecution of the Department, and congratulate themselves that no Court of Inquiry has been asked for.

THE English bandmaster who played "Willie, We Have Missed You," when Kaiser William landed at Portsmouth on Monday on his visit to his grandmother, Queen Victoria, has as much humor in his make-up as a Yankee. As there is no such thing as a free lunch in England, the bold Briton who dared poke such a joke at the war lord was perfectly safe. And it appears the Kaiser appreciated the joke so much that he shook hands with the bandmaster, smiling as he did so.

At the meeting of the Democratic National Committee in Chicago on Monday it was decided to shelve free silver in the national campaign next year, and to fight the presidential battle on the issues of trusts, imperialism and militarism, and "Bryan and Free Silver." If possible, will be heard of no more. The party is hard up for an issue but must take up something, although the outlook for success is worse than it was in 1896. A policy of dishonor will not prove acceptable in 1900 any more than it did three years ago.

AGNIE BOUTWELL, the side-partner of Atkinson and Aguilardo, must be quite discouraged over the result of the election. In a recent letter to an Indianapolis friend, in which he discussed the question of how the "aunties" could accomplish their purpose, whatever it is, he said: "First of all we must get a popular judgment against McKinley; as long as the people are with him, there is no hope." The splendid Republican majorities in Ohio, Kentucky, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and other states do not indicate that it will be practicable to get a "popular judgment against McKinley."

It is well known that many unusual things happen in Jersey, but we doubt if anything more unusual has happened lately in that state of surprises than the run of a very heavy passenger train from Camden to Reading City on the Philadelphia & Atlantic Railway on Monday, the 20th inst. The distance between the two points is 55.5 miles and was made in 47 minutes, or at the rate of 70.5 miles an hour. **SIX RAILROADERS KILLED**  
By a Rear End Collision on the Baltimore and Ohio Road.

Garrettsville, Ind., Nov. 23.—The heavy Baltimore and Ohio's limited passenger train, drawn by two locomotives, ran into the rear end of a freight train near McCool, a small station 50 miles out of Chicago, yesterday afternoon. Both the passenger engines were demolished and their crews killed. The train was almost a total wreck. Its conductor, Mr. Butts, and Rear Brake-man Hamilton are missing, and their bodies are doubtless buried under the debris of their engine. A special train arrived here with four injured trainmen and the following is dead: Henry Bradford, engineer; E. J. Sargent, engineer; Elmer Orr, fireman; John Stine, fireman. Each of the dead men leaves a family and all were among the best known employees of the road.

**Crocker Saves the Parnell Home.**  
New York, Nov. 23.—The mission of Lord Mayor Daniel Tallon, of Dublin, and John E. Redmond, M. P., to this country in the interest of preserving the Parnell homestead in County Wicklow, Ireland, has been successful. Last night Thomas P. Smith, private secretary to Richard Crocker and general secretary of Tammany Hall, presented to the lord mayor, in the name of Tammany Hall, a certified check for \$2,000 to have the Parnell homestead. This was in excess of the amount needed.

**THE WAR IN AFRICA.**  
Seven Thousand Boers Advancing on Pietermaritzburg.

London, Nov. 23.—Although it is evident that the situation in Natal is again becoming sufficiently alarming, nothing can be officially ascertained to allay public anxiety or the curiosity felt regarding the disposition of the reinforcements recently landed at Durban. The war office dispatches are confined to a mere recital of a few casualties at Mooi River, which confirm the reports of skirmishes there, but give no details.

One correspondent says that 7,000 Boers are within 25 miles of Howick Falls, near Pietermaritzburg, and that the inhabitants are fleeing to the capital. Evidently a considerable force of the enemy is now within 30 or 40 miles of Pietermaritzburg.

A Pretoria dispatch says the official returns of Transvaal casualties since the outbreak of the war show that 90 men have been killed and 200 wounded, of whom a number have recovered and returned to the front.

Newspaper reports from Cape Colony say a general rising of the Dutch farmers is imminent in Natal and that the colonial Boers in those districts which have been proclaimed republican territory have already joined the Boer forces.

**Smuggled Pearls Not Very Valuable.**  
New York, Nov. 23.—An informal appraisalment of the imitation pearls seized from Francois Beck, of Providence, R. I., a passenger on the French liner La Bretagne, was made yesterday by the appraiser's stores. One thousand of the pearls were taken haphazard from a box containing about 50,000 and weighed. The result of the examination fixed the value of all the pearls seized at about \$2,500.

**OUR KLONDIKE TRAIL.**  
It Will Enable Americans to Prospect Without Foreign Interference.  
New York, Nov. 23.—Captain William R. Abernethy, who has spent three years in Alaskan exploration and who has just surveyed an all-American route to the Klondike, passed through New York yesterday on his way to Washington to make his report to Secretary Root. He said:  
"The main feature of the expedition from which I have just returned is the completion of plans for the opening of the Klondike region for the American miner, so he can land at Valdez with his pack pony and prospect any part of the public domain without interference from the officials of a foreign country. The trail I have surveyed is 280 miles from the boundary and through the heart of Alaska. I surveyed about 700 miles and I built an all-American trail four feet wide, with a view to its ultimate widening, 75 miles long, through the Rocky mountain divisions from Valdez to the Torsina river, which flows into the Copper river.

"This road, of course, is merely a trail, and very crude, but its course well watered and game is plentiful, especially bears, goats and wild sheep. During the coming year there will be numerous enterprises embarked in Alaska, and especially in the Yukon country. The country to be opened to settlement is fully twice as large as the New England States and will support thousands of people."

Macon, Nov. 23.—Mayor S. B. Price, of Macon, died yesterday afternoon. He was one of the most widely known public men in Georgia. He served in the Confederate army. He was elected mayor in 1884, which position he has occupied continuously with the exception of two years, 1894 and 1895, when he was legislator out of office. Those years he served as postmaster of Macon.

**FLOODS THREATEN TEXAS.**  
Families Fleeing For Their Lives From the Bottom Lands.  
Denison, Tex., Nov. 23.—This section is in the early stages of a flood that threatens to be the most disastrous known in many years. Thousands of acres of valuable farming lands are already under water, and families are fleeing for their lives from the bottom lands.  
The situation is decidedly serious, as it is thought that many houses will be swept away. The Washita, the largest river in the Indian Territory, is at the highest stage ever known. Great damage has been done by the high water. The town of Paula Valley, on the Santa Fe, in the territory, is reported by telephone as under water. No trains are crossing the Santa Fe railway bridge near Gainesville.

All the large streams in the southern portion of the Indian Territory are out of their banks, and enormous damage has been done to farming lands. There is no ferry communication between Texas and the territory. Red river and Washita are still rising rapidly.

**Taylor's Plurality 3,429.**  
Louisville, Nov. 23.—The county election board convened yesterday to hear argument on the motion to throw out the whole vote of the city of Louisville and to receive from the accountants footings of the official count for Jefferson county. The vote for governor was announced as follows: Taylor, 18,445; Goebel, 15,023; Brown, 2,672. Taylor's plurality, 3,422. Affidavits were presented relative to the presence of the militia in this city on election day, and today the board is listening to arguments.
