OUR COUNTRY: First, Last and Forever.

BEFORE winter comes on the Supervisor should fill up the many cuts in the streets and put East Centre street in passable condition for teams.

THE increased amount of money in circulation has made quite a perceptible change for the better in conditions in town, and as the outlook is very favorable for full time all winter Shenandoah will soon be the liveliest town in the county.

**The Coal Famine.**

The coal famine, which was first felt three months ago throughout the county, has attained alarming proportions, and the prospects are that conditions will grow worse instead of better. The railroads are doing their best to move the coal that is mined, but they lack the necessary cars, and the famine is scarcely even mitigated.

All over the United States furnaces with gaping jaws are swallowing coal as fast as it can be shovelled into them, and then they gasp for more, until they die out and lie cold because there isn't enough to keep them going.

The story of the current coal famine is the old story on which the changes have been rung for months past—too much prosperity, too heavy demands upon the manufacturing resources of the country; prospects of immense profits in sight and not enough power to grasp them at once. One year ago there were but eight furnaces in blast for the manufacture of iron and steel. To-day, in Pennsylvania and the states adjoining, there are ninety-four of them.

This country is supplying the world with iron and steel, and the coal to make the product has to be had at any price. But the blast furnaces find themselves in fierce competition with hundreds of other industries, and the whole strength of the general clamor is hurled against the railroads that have not the cars and the motive power to transport the coal which the mines are turning out as fast as lies in their power.

It is rumored that there are now from 3,500 to 3,000 gondola cars carrying ore from the Lakes, which will be brought in to relieve the situation as soon as the lakes freeze up. But this is rumor merely. The drain on bituminous coal has been transferred to the anthracite supply, and it is thought the private consumer will shortly find that prices for domestic grades will jump to unheard of figures.

Among the developments which have occurred in the larger area of general trade and manufacture, with the growth of the coal famine, are these:

Transatlantic steamers, carrying the mails, both from Philadelphia and from New York, have been detained from six to ten hours because it was impossible for them to get bunker coal, which comes from the Clearfield region.

All New England is out of coal, and New York is paying almost any price for the bituminous variety. Steamers sailing from New York have paid as high as \$2.50 per ton, without freights, at the mines for coal which sold three months ago for 65 cents.

Throughout Kensington, near Philadelphia, countless mills that can not secure bituminous coal have been compelled to carry on their work with prepared sizes of anthracite.

The Baldwin Locomotive Works closed for two days last week, and is now so short of coal that the men are on half time. The Phoenix Iron Works were closed down for the

better part of last week, and they are also on half time.

It is impossible now to buy steam sizes in anthracite, and the domestic sizes are being employed. There is, in fact, no bituminous coal in the market, and buckwheat and pea coal in anthracite are nearly as scarce. The storage yards at Mahanoy City and Landingville, usually at this season piled full, are almost bare, only the smaller sizes being left and those sizes going as fast as cars can be procured to load.

The company will be known as the Consolidated Montana Sheep and Lamb company, with a capital of \$10,000,000.

**Evidence Against Mrs. Bamberger.**

St. Louis, Nov. 27.—Octavo Didier, an expressman, is under arrest in connection with the case of Mrs. Henriette Bamberger, the midwife who is in jail awaiting trial under an indictment of murder in the first degree. The expressman says he handled a trunk from the house of Mrs. Bamberger in March, 1896, about the time that Ida New, better known as Zimmerman, disappeared, to the Meramec river, where it has been said the body of that woman was thrown. Mrs. Bamberger, an older woman accompanied the trunk and disposed of it. Didier said he could identify the trunk if found.

**Homeed in by Rising Waters.**

Fort Worth, Tex., Nov. 27.—The rapid rise in the Trinity river has assumed serious proportions. Much damage to property and cattle has been reported and this morning word comes from the country immediately north of Fort Worth that several families are hemmed in by the high waters, with little hope for immediate rescue. The river is steadily rising. The police have notified families living along the river bottoms of the danger from inundation and preparations are being made for a hurried scramble for safety.

**No Crisis in New Foundland.**

Hallifax, N. S., Nov. 27.—Speaker Mott, of the New Foundland legislature, has arrived here. To a press correspondent he stated that the report sent out from St. John's, N. F., that Minister of Marine acarine had resigned and that the present colonial government would shortly dissolve was incorrect. He said Mr. Morine's resignation had not even been thought of, and the government was not thinking of running an election.

**Emperor's Gift to Chicago Germans.**

Chicago, Nov. 27.—Dr. Von Hellebrand, German ambassador to the United States, yesterday, in the presence of 2,000 Germans, presented a flag sent by Emperor William to the United German soldier societies of Chicago. The emperor requests that the flag be passed from one society to another, to be kept by each for a year at a time.

## ZAMBONIAN GOALS OURS.

### Entire Province Surrenders Unconditionally to the Americans.

#### FILIPINOS' LAST WAR COUNCIL.

It Was Held by the Elector Rebel Leaders on Nov. 18, and It Was Resolved to No Longer Oppose the Americans With United Forces.

Manila, Nov. 27.—The entire province of Zamboanga, island of Mindanao, has surrendered unconditionally to Commander Very, of the Cavite. The surrender was made on the 18th inst. The surrender of this province is regarded as the beginning of the end of the revolution in the island of Mindanao, and, it is believed, will be a hard blow to those who are still endeavoring to maintain the insurrection in the island of Luzon. Zamboanga is the principal city of the island of Mindanao, which is the second largest island of the Philippine group.

On the 21st Admiral Watson called the Washington officials that Commander Very had captured the city of Zamboanga on the 18th. He was aided by friendly natives and Moros, and was holding the town pending the arrival of reinforcements from Jolo. On the same day General Otis ordered two companies of Infantry to be sent to Zamboanga from Jolo.

The last Filipino council of war was held by the retreating leaders at Bayombong on Nov. 18, in the house now occupied by the American forces. It was attended by Aguinaldo, del Pilar, Garcia, Alejandro and some members of the so-called cabinet. Information has reached General MacArthur from several sources to the effect that the council recognized the futility of attempting further resistance to the Americans with united forces, and agreed that the Filipino troops should scatter and should hereafter follow guerrilla methods.

Reports of ambuscades and skirmishes come from every section of the country along the railroad. Those districts seem to be filled with small bands. Saturday four men of Company D, Ninth Infantry, were foraging beyond Bamban, when 20 Filipino took them in ambush, killing one and capturing the other three. The Americans resisted for half an hour. The firing being heard at Bamban, Lieutenant Brown, with a squad, followed the retreating Filipino several miles. The Americans found the body of a soldier killed. They turned the hamlet where the fight took place.

Three Filipino riflemen ambushed an American surgeon near Capas. He shot one and the others fled. Lieutenant Brown, at J. Angeles, a mole train was fired upon by the insurgents, and a Spaniard, a former prisoner of the Filipinos, who was with the train, was shot. At Misaki the officials who welcomed the Americans were murdered. This was the only railroad town which the Americans did not garnish, and on the night the insurgents, with a band of irregular troops, dragged Antonio Mejia, president of the town, into the street and cut his throat. The murderers then assassinated the vice president and five members of the town council in the same manner and told the frightened natives who witness the slaughter to spread the news that a similar fate awaited all friends of the Americans.

The mayor of San Carlos, who rode in the carriage with General MacArthur and Colonel Bell when the Americans entered the town, amid the cheers of the people, was murdered the next night.

Military activity continues in every section. Colonel Bell's regiment has advanced from Bayombong upon Mangatagan, where it is supposed there is a large insurgent force. "Two battalions of the newly arrived Twenty-eighth Infantry have been sent by Francisco to Bacoor, to reinforce the south line.

Major Spence, with 50 men of the Thirty-third regiment, surrounded a village near Baitacion during the night and attacked the place at daybreak, capturing a Filipino captain and 15 men, with seven rifles.

The latest news from General Young is that there are ten cavalrymen and 200 Maccabees with him, most of the horsemen who started because they were compelled to drop out because their horses failed them.

The Filipinos took the American prisoners from Victoria to San Carlos. On the walls of the Victoria prison and of the San Carlos convent are the following names:
