THE SAMOAN AGREEMENT STANDS. Government Has Not Rejected

the Anglo-German Trenty. London, Nov. 29 .- It is officially reorted that the statement that th Inited States has rejected the agree ment between Great Britain and Germany regarding Samoa and has sub-mitted a new draft of an agreement is misleading. The exact status of the Samon question is as follows:

Consequent upon the signing of the Samoan treaty between Germany and Great Britain, to which the United States had signified its assent, there was drawn up a new form of agree-ment between Great Britain and the United States. This was necessitated by the new order of things, but in nowise affected the validity of the German-British agreement, which in-cluded spheres of influence in Africa and other matters entirely foreign to American Interests. The statement that the agreement has been rejected is based, according to the British officials, entirely upon the suggestions made by the United States of a change in the wording of the draft of the agreement between herself and Great Britain. These changes are entirely grammatical and will be acceded to.
